Close With Potluck

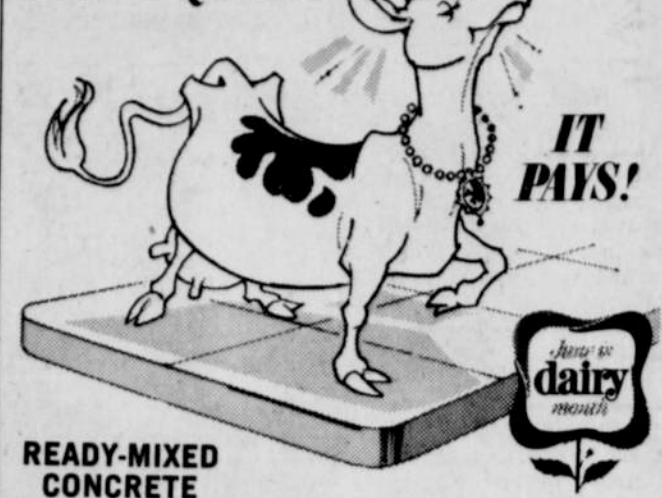
Clyde Swisher and members of the Adult Literature class closed the winter session Wednesday evening, June 2 with a potluck buffet dinner at the Library Meeting room.

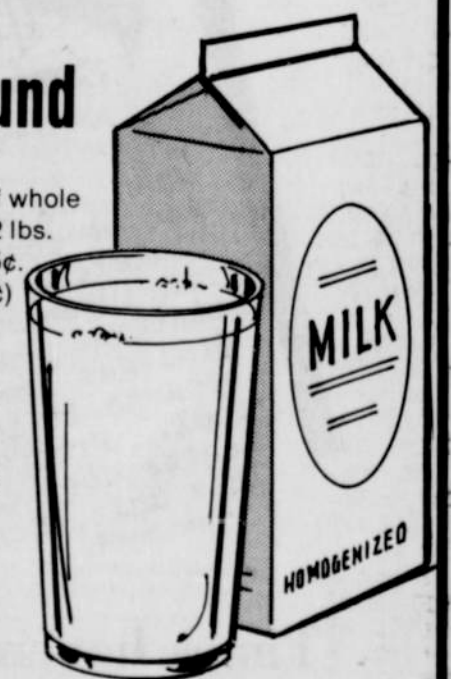
