OREGON WRESTLING CLINIC NEXT WEEK

Oregon's ninth annual Wrestling Coaches Clinic will be held Thursday through Monday, June 17-21, at Siuslaw junior high school at Florence. The workshop, which carries two hours of college credit, is designed for high school and junior high wrestling coaches in Oregon and surrounding states.

As in past years, arrangements have been made for camping space at the baseball park area of Honeyman State Park for coaches and their families, while motel facilities are available in nearby Florence. The workshop begins Thursday morning, June 17. Sessions will be held from 8 a.m. till noon and from 7 to 10 p.m., leaving afternoons open for family recreational activities.

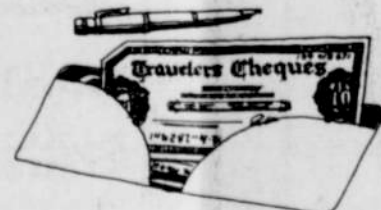

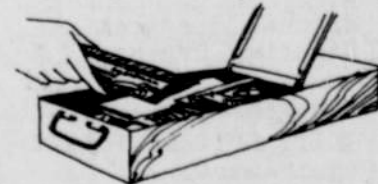
