20 YEARS AGO

30 YEARS AGO

Nyssa's \$207,000 underpass will open to restricted traffic on Saturday according to Tom Edwards, Oregon State Highway Department engineer. The underpass will not however be completely finished until about August 1, just a year from the time that Henry Horn the contractor, started the construction.

The Nyssa underpass is one of the costliest in the state, and the largest in eastern Oregon. Into it's construction went 760,000 pounds of structural steel, 450,000 pounds of reinforcing steel, 5000 cubic yards of concrete. Thirty-thousand yards of dirt were moved in the excavation. The underpass is equipped with an automatic pump to take care of the water.

In celebration of the completion of the underpass, Dr. K. E. Kerby, president of the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce has appointed J. B. Geizeltanner and Bernard Eastman as a committee to arrange a suitable program to be staged on July 24.

40 YEARS AGO

Walter Marionholtz of Middleton, formerly of Nyssa, has inherited an estate in Germany valued at more than \$300,000. He is making arrangements to leave Middleton and his adopted land in June, as the will of his aunt, in which he is named beneficiary, calls for his return to Germany.

To the old German custom of priority for the eldest son, Marionholtz gives credit for his good fortune. The estate was owned by his two maiden aunts many years. They had named his father their heir but after death Marionholtz was next in line.

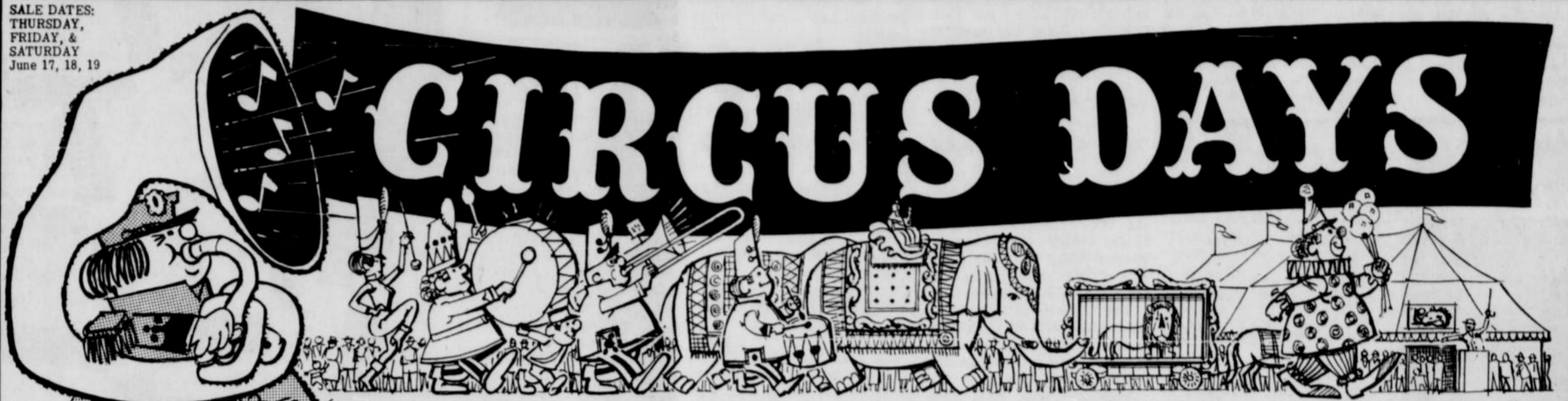
