Skinner Named Grand Marshall Of Vale Parade

A well known Jordan Valley pioneer, S.K. "Kirt" Skinner, has been named as Grand Marshall of the Vale July 4th parade, one of the highlights of the famous celebration held here annually for more than 50 years. Skinner was selected for the signal honor from a slate of candidates submitted from Ironside, Ontario, Juntura, Nyssa, Vale and Jordan Valley.

The celebration will be held this year on July 2, 3 and 4 with July 3 set aside as the day on which Skinner will be particularly honored. He will lead the wild horse parade held especially for him and will be honored at special ceremonies in the Vale City Park following the parade. A public barbecue will be served after the conclusion of the park ceremonies.

Skinner, a native of Jordan Valley and a lifetime rancher in that community, has not only been a leader in modern ranching techniques, but has been

active all his life in community affairs, serving on local school boards for many years, as well as the IED Board since its inception. He has been active in and held offices of various livestock associations, the Farm Bureau, and both the Idaho and Oregon Historical societies, among other civic interests.

Selection of the Grand Marshall is made by a committee of seven persons representing the Vale Chamber of Commerce, Vale Rodeo Board, the past Grand Marshall, Wm. G. Ross of Vale, and two members at large. Nominations are limited to residents and/or former residents of Malheur county. Candidates are selected on the basis of their contribution to the livestock industry, community service, the sport of rodeo and contributions to the growth and development of Malheur county.

WOOL REFERENDUM DEADLINE NEARS

Ballots voted by producers in the mail referendum on wool and lamb promotion are now arriving in the County ASCS Office, Blaine Girvin, Chairman of the Malheur Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee said today.

"Friday, June 18, is the last day for voting. Ballots not received in the County ASCS Office by close of business on that date cannot be counted," he said.

Producers eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who have owned sheep, 6 months of age or older, for 30 consecutive days during 1970.

An agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC) provides for (1) the U.S. Department of agriculture and the ASPC to set deduction rates not to exceed 1.5 cents per pound from payments to producers on wool marketed in 1971, 1972, and 1973 and 7.5 cents a hundredweight on unshorn lamb payments; (2) the ASPC to use the deduction to continue to finance advertising and sales promotion programs to encourage the use of wool and lamb products. The new agreement would be similar to 4 previous agreements approved by wool producers since 1954.

To become effective, the agreement must be approved nationally by two-thirds of the number of growers voting, or by growers producing two-thirds of the total wool production represented in the referendum.

If the agreement is not approved, no deductions will be withheld from producer payments on 1971 marketings. ASPC programs would continue as long as reserve funds permit, or until wool producers approved some other agreement.

SUMMER SCIENCE PROGRAM PLANNED

Summer science happenings for 4th, 5th and 6th grade students, a new program at Treasure Valley Community College, will get under way on Monday, June 21. An activity filled two week session is planned to run Monday through Thursday until July 1, according to Wally Johnson, chairman of the college's science department. Each day's activities begin at 1:00 p.m. and run to 4:00 p.m.

Some of the happenings include: the building of a cloud chamber to study radioactivity, each student will build a telescope when the subject of light is touched upon, an electric motor will be constructed by each of the participants, and all students will make a sun dial as the result of studying the sun and sun spots. A field trip to Capitol High School's planetarium is the featured activity of the second day of the program. Bonus activities include using water pollution kits, identification of fossils and rocks, and an evening with TVCC's telescope for a first hand glimpse of the moon, stars and planets.

Johnson pointed out that the first hour each day is set aside for guided exploring with the equipment to be used later in the day. From 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. project time will be the order of the day.
