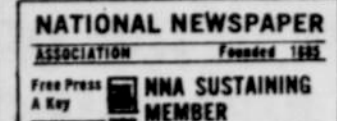

**30 YEARS AGO**

Maybe it was Friday the 13th for some folks, and with it the presumed bad luck, but not for Eris Jamison, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.L. Jamison. For on Friday of last week, John Lienhard, chairman of the board announced that Miss Jamison's name had been selected from a hat containing the names of some 12 young ladies who would measure up to the standards of what the Fair Board had set for the Queen of Malheur County Fair. Princeses are Marguerite Arrien of Vale and Tiny Doolittle of Ontario.

Beginning July 1, the price of delivered milk in Nyssa will be 11 cents per quart and pints 6 cents. Prices on cream will be quarts 55 cents, pints 30 cents and 1/2 pints 17 cents. Questioned as to the reason for the raise in prices, owners said that the cost of operations of a dairy had materially advanced during the past year.

**40 YEARS AGO**

Construction of the Homedale branch of the Oregon Short Line out of Nyssa in 1912 spelled promise for a budding town named Adrian, a station 12 miles south of Nyssa on the Snake River, and the end of the little village that a few years previous had given itself the name of Riverview.

Riverview had a store established by Holly Brothers in 1911. It was the site of a ferry operated by the county across the Snake. The government gave the community a postoffice. It was quite a town, but like many early day trading posts, it found that coming of the railroad required a move to a more advantageous location. Even the old ferry was abandoned when the highway bridge was built to span the river nearer the railroad in 1914.

The townsite laid out in the rolling sage by the late Reuben McCreary, Holly Brothers purchased three lots in the fall of 1917 and erected a building. They moved their stock and postoffice into it. The station was named Adrian by the railroad company and after some pressure, the postoffice was changed from Riverview to Adrian.

In 1918 Thos. Coward of Nyssa

looked with favor upon the budding town and opened a lumber yard. It was purchased by E.C. VanPetten of Ontario a year later. The coming of the automobile made it necessary for Adrian to have a garage, so in 1920 D.T. Holly built a garage which was first operated by Hatch and Davis. It is now under the management of John Enos.

Holly Brothers enlarged their store in 1923. In 1925 Harvey Otis built a second garage and associated with him is his brother Webb Otis, who does general blacksmithing. The same year G. Johanson and Clark Enos erected a building for Joe Harris, restaurant owner. The building houses a confectionery and pool hall, now under the management of Winifred Powell.

Holly Brothers added their store in 1927 and W.E. Ashcraft built Adrian's first barber shop.

Latest expansion is the hotel and barber shop building erected by E.G. Hopkins this spring.

Since work began on the Owyhee Irrigation Project, business has increased two fold at Adrian. Located in the heart of the Owyhee, Adrian has a promising future.

**50 YEARS AGO**

Library work has a great appeal to many women. A girl is sure of a good deal of liberty in such work, and can feel fairly certain of permanent employment.

But salaries are small, very small. Like the teacher, the librarian must struggle to make ends meet and keep up appearances. She usually had a thorough education and a special training that has cost money. It is high time to insist on proper increase in library salaries.

**60 YEARS AGO**

The Commercial Club of Ontario is working on a campaign to secure \$10,000 to be donated towards the erection of a hospital which will be thoroughly modern in every respect. This hospital will be the only public institution of its kind between Baker City and Boise, and will be a valuable asset to Malheur County. It is to cost \$40,000 and will be equipped with all the modern life saving appliances. It is conceded by all medical men that the Catholic Sisters are the most successful hospital managers and it is proposed to make this one, as good as any in the Northwest. The hospital location is considered ideal and is to be entirely public and every physician in the county, also Harney county will be invited to freedom of the institution.

**CIVIL AIR PATROL**

The Nyssa Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol was called out last week to fly a route search between Baker and Ontario for a lost aircraft. The plane was located by a group from Pendleton, just SE of Pendleton. Father Young, Leroy Baer, John Palmer, Charlie Chapin, and Jack Walker of the Nyssa Squadron all participated.
