Mr. and Mrs. George Moates of Murrough, Idaho, visited from Friday until Monday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Wernick.

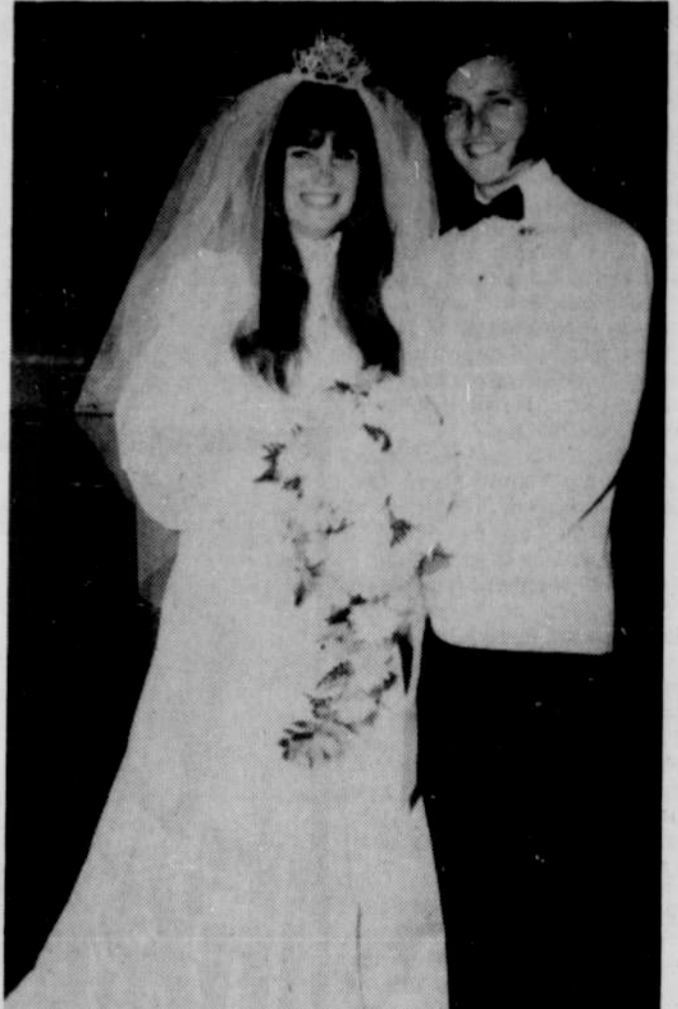
