Secretary Of State Myers Lauds Youth Commission

The Governor's Commission on Youth emerged from its first legislative session with a solid string of successes, according to Commission Chairman Clay Myers.

Myers said the Youth Commission, created by executive order of Governor Tom McCall in May 1969, initiated some bills, prompted introduction of others, and officially supported passage of numerous other measures related to children and youth.

"The 1971 legislature enacted a variety of laws that will measurably improve the well-being of young people in Oregon for years to come," Myers said, "and I'm pleased the Youth Commission played such an active role in their adoption."

Myers said he was particularly gratified with passage of Senate Bill 48, which was introduced at the request of the Youth Commission. The measure corrected a "loophole" in Oregon's adoption laws that had permitted a natural mother to reclaim her child after she had given up her rights and the child had been legally adopted.

SELECTIVE SERVICE

HONORS MEMBERS

Two (2) CERTIFICATES OF APPRECIATION AND Emblems have recently been awarded to uncompensated personnel of Local Board No. 22, Selective Service.

Robert McConaha, principal of Ontario High School, received a Certificate of Appreciation for 15 years as Registrar and Advisor to Registrants of Local Board No. 22.

Mary F. Graham, Justice of the Peace, Vale, was awarded a certificate for 20 years of service as a Registrar. The untiring efforts of all uncompensated members have done and do much to insure the efficient and equitable administration of the Selective Service System throughout the State and Nation.

The Local Board has a 5-member board, namely, Francis R. Chilman, Chairman, and Leeds Bailey from Ontario; Roy Hirai, Nyssa; George B. McClure and William M. Phillips of Vale. They meet once a month on the first Tuesday following the 10th of each month.

The Selective Service Regulations require that every young man must register on his 18th birthday or within five (5) days THEREAFTER unless on active duty, even though he may be a member of a Reserve or National Guard. Please contact the Local Board office, phone 889-6322, Ontario, in case of unavoidable circumstances which make it impossible to register on time. The board office in Ontario also has a list posted on the door of places to register other than in the Local Board Office.

The Youth Commission also stimulated introduction and enactment of Senate Bill 531, which simplifies the procedure for issuance of work permits for minors.

Other new laws in which the Youth Commission took an active interest included:

-- House Bill 1844, which establishes a commission to review and update the child welfare and juvenile court statutes;

-- House Bill 1228, which expands purchase of care for young people placed in private agencies;

-- House Joint Resolution 47, which ratifies the U. S. Constitutional amendment lowering the voting age to 18;

-- House Bill 1601, which appropriates \$125,000 state funds in order to generate \$375,000 in federal money to develop local day care programs in Oregon;

-- House Bill 1930, which creates a Children's Division within a Department of Human Resources to coordinate and administer juvenile welfare and correctional statutes;

-- House Bill 1754, which improves reporting procedures, and designates those required to report, suspected cases of child abuse by parents.

Work Smarter - Not Harder

Bothered with unmarked items received through the mail? The new postal regulation act bans this practice except if the package is clearly marked "free sample" or if it is from a charitable organization seeking a contribution.

Even then, you may use the item or discard it without paying for it. It is illegal for the sender to request payment.

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Puddings come frozen, refrigerated, canned, packaged as mixes--some to be cooked and some as "instant." Which are most economical?

The costs vary considerably so it pays to compare. If pudding is made from scratch it costs about 6 cents per serving if the recipe uses egg. Regular dry pudding mixes cost

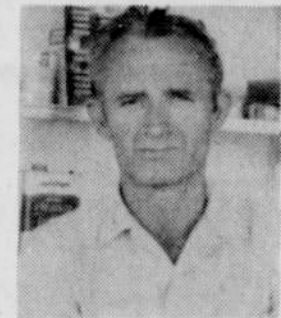
about 8 cents per serving while instant pudding (after adding milk) also costs about 8 cents.

Canned puddings will cost about 10 cents a serving while those packaged in individual servings may run up to 16 cents. Frozen puddings average about 12 cents per serving. The most costly of all are the new refrigerated puddings at about 20 cents per serving.

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What makes corners of permanent press shirts collars wear or fray? This may be due to overloading the washer. Six permanent press shirts make a washer load. If these garments are put in with muslin sheets or other fabrics that may cause abrasion, wear in certain areas will appear.

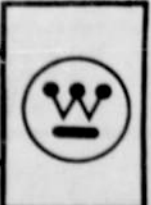
