

Carol Greig And Scout Team To Represent USA In Greenland

Carol Greig, Senior Scout, daughter of Mrs. Martin Greig of Nyssa and a Nyssa High School graduate who is now a senior majoring in Physical Education at the University of Oregon in Eugene, is busy these days preparing for a trip to Greenland to attend the 1971 Greenland Jamboree and to represent the United States of America and also the Girl Scouts of the United States of America.



She will leave for New York from Boise Friday, July 9, and will meet other members of her team in New York where they will be orientated for their part in the Jamboree.

Carol's five senior scouts are juniors or seniors in high school, and are Helen Dickson (Eskimo) from Nome, Alaska; Terri Ordway from Central Alaska (she has the distinction of being the farthest North Girl Scout in the entire organization of GSUSA); Georgia Ann Finnegan of St. Paul, Minn.; Mary Kate Wold of Bottineau, North Dakota; and Jane Ellen Patterson of Albany, N.Y. This team will represent the entire United States at the Jamboree.

The actual jamboree will take place from July 26 to August 3 with the two weeks prior to that being spent touring the west coast of Greenland and doing some primitive camping. From August 3 until the 12th the group will be in Copenhagen, Denmark living with Danish families and taking part in guide activities there.

Since Carol's return to Nyssa from college this spring she has received letters of greetings and congratulations from Mark O. Hatfield and Al Ullman. July 6th, Carol received airmail-special delivery, the following from the office of President Nixon.

Dear Miss Greig:

Through the thoughtfulness of Mrs. Walter McKenzie, President Nixon has learned that you have been selected by the Girl

Scouts of America to lead the team of five girls who will represent the United States at the International Scout Jamboree in Holsteinsborg, Greenland, this month. This is indeed an outstanding honor, and the President sends his heartiest congratulations to you.

He was pleased to know of your deep interest in the scouting movement and you may be sure that you have his sincere appreciation for your willingness to give so unselfishly of your time and energy to serve the young women of our country. Your efforts to prepare them for the duties and privileges of good citizenship will benefit all America.

With the President's best wishes to you and your team members for a most rewarding and enjoyable trip.

The letter's signature was of Raymond K. Price, Special Assistant to the President.

After Carol's return to the United States she plans to be in Nyssa until September 20 and stated that she would be glad to tell any person or group about her experiences and would show slides and gifts.

Carol would especially like to stress that any Girl Scout should know that this same opportunity is available for them as even now there are opportunities going half filled for lack of enough girls applying. She stated it is very worth their while to stay in Scouts and stay active and as soon as one is a senior scout or older, apply and remain active! It would be great if more girls could take part in these chances and see a little more of the world and understand a little more of the people in it because of Girl Scouting.

BIG GAME RULE BOOKS AVAILABLE

Big game hunting regulations booklets are now available. Hunters wishing to obtain copies may do so at any license agency. All big game seasons for 1971 are listed in the booklet as well as rules on arms and ammunition, possession and transportation of game animals, and other general regulations.

Hunters who wish to file for special tags or permits will find full instructions on pages 31, 32, and 33. The Game Commission urges hunters to check these over carefully for proper procedures before filing applications.

The Game Commission also reminds hunters that to be eligible for the drawings, applications for special permits and tags must be received at the Commission's Portland headquarters by 5 p.m. on the filing deadline date.

EARLY HUNTING APPLICATIONS DUE

Big game hunters are reminded that the deadline for submitting applications for antelope, bighorn sheep, and August deer seasons is fast approaching. If hunters wish to be included in the drawings for any of these big game seasons, they must have their applications at the Game Commission's Portland headquarters by 5 p.m. July 13. The drawing to determine successful applicants is scheduled for 10 a.m. July 23.

Bighorn sheep and antelope hunters must file on the controlled season application form obtained at license agencies. Deer hunters must file on the permit application form received with the purchase of the general season deer tag.

Antelope hunters are reminded that changes have been made in the antelope hunting areas this year and are urged to check the big game rule book carefully before filing. The six broad regional antelope hunting areas no longer exist. Instead, these have been split

into 16 game management units with a specified number of tags to be issued for each. Hunters, for the first time, will submit applications and draw in the 16 areas.

Hunters are also advised that the Interstate Unit antelope hunting area includes only the Lake County portion of the unit.

Youth Golf Classic Saturday At Ontario

A local qualifying round for the third Insurance Youth Golf Classic will be held at Ontario Golf Course on Saturday, July 10, announced chairman Paul Johnston of Malheur Insurance.

The annual event is sponsored by the Malheur Insurance, Blackaby Insurance, Iseri Insurance, Nolan Field Insurance agencies, in cooperation with the Oregon and National Associations of Insurance Agents.

Any boy less than 18 years old who qualifies under USGA Rules of Amateur Status may participate in any one of 15 local qualifying tournaments which have been scheduled throughout Oregon during June

and July. Entry forms are available now at golf courses throughout the state and at the offices of local independent insurance agents. Completed entry blanks for the Ontario tournament must be submitted no later than July 9, to Mark Hopkins, Pro, Ontario Golf Course, Ontario, Oregon.

The two lowest scorers in each of the 18 local qualifying tournaments may enter the 36-hole state qualifying tournament which is sponsored by the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents under the direction of state chairman Fred Greatwood of Eugene.

The state play-off will be held Monday, July 19 at Riverside Golf and Country Club, Portland. A maximum of 50 players will participate.

State low scorer and two runners-up may advance to the Insurance Youth Classic national championships which will be held at Craig-Hill Country Club, Vrookport, New York, August 25 through 29.

Nyssa Beats Dallas

Bryan Feik pitched Nyssa Junior Legion to a 2-1 win over Dallas Monday evening with a five-hitter, and fanned 11 batters. The only Dallas run was scored on a passed ball.

John Bernal scored both runs for Nyssa. His first run was in the third inning when he singled, stole two bases, and scored on an error. He walked in the seventh, stole second, and scored on a hit by Steve Ross into left field.

The national tournament carries with it a \$40,000 prize purse for 20 professional golfers who will participate with the youthful finalists in the last 36 holes of the "Insurance Youth Classic."

"Each professional golfer will be playing for a minimum purse ranging from a low of \$1,000 to the top prize of \$8,000, for the 36 holes played in the Insurance Youth Classic," Mr. Johnston, local chairman, said, "but that's not important. What is important is the million dollars worth of satisfaction the professionals will get teaming with the youthful players."

Game Commission Warns To Leave Fawns Alone

The Oregon Game Commission has issued a stern warning to outdoor travelers to leave fawn deer or other wildlife youngsters alone. The warning was made because of the high incidence of "fawn-napping" which has occurred this spring with more than 20 individuals apprehended for this illegal act.

Although some fawns were picked up deliberately and taken home as pets, others were supposedly lost or abandoned orphans, according to the individuals who discovered them. The latter is not true, the Commission said. The fawn is not lost or abandoned, and if left alone, the mother would return to her youngster shortly after the human danger has passed.

The Commission reminded citizens that Oregon law prohibits taking, carrying, or removing from its natural habitat, and to hold in captivity the young of any game bird or animal of the state.

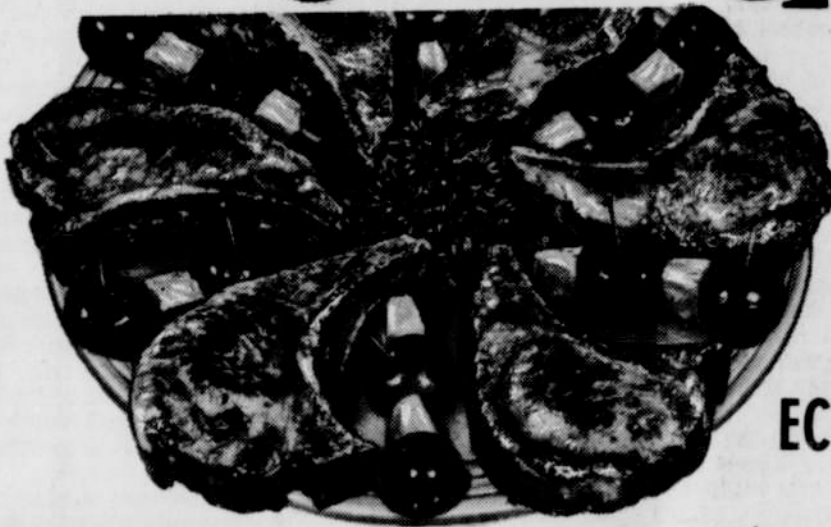
