MALHEUR COUNTY ECONOMY STABLE

The U.S. Labor Department has added Deschutes and Grant counties to the areas in Oregon of substantial unemployment and Umatilla county has been changed from the substantial to the persistent unemployment list, Ross Morgan, administrator, Employment Division reported here. Morgan also said that Malheur county has been removed from the list of Oregon substantial unemployment areas. Those areas placed on the substantial and persistent unemployment list are eligible for Federal assistance under Title I of the Public Works and Economic Development Act, effective July 1.

The Employment Division report which recommended removal of the Ontario Labor Area, including Malheur county, Oregon and Payette and Washington counties, Idaho, from the substantial unemployment list said: "The economy of Malheur, Payette and Washington counties in Oregon and Idaho is quite stable.
