Granny's WASH BOARD - WASH DAYS

Washday from the book of Great Grandmother Burger, published in 1800. Information by Mrs. Dale Witt.

WASH DAY
To do washing the easiest and best it is conceded by all that the clothes should be put to soak over night. On Monday it takes all the forenoon in most families to put things to rights and to get something cooked. Besides its not pleasant for (either mistress or girl) on Sunday evening to work at the soiled clothes for an hour. It either involves staying home from church, or working late after one does get home to say nothing of the "Sabbath Day" view of it.

There are many new soaps now manufactured that give excellent satisfaction, requiring no boiling of clothes. To persons who use such, let me recommend to put the clothes to soak in warm suds after dinner Monday, after soaking put them through the wringer and put in clean suds. On Tuesday morning the washing is a quick job, just rub lightly on the wash board

and rinse thoroughly. To those who prefer to boil their clothes, I give two recipes for washing preparations, both are good. Some housekeepers don't like to boil their clothes, in the dirt, but if you will throw your prejudice to the winds and try it for one month you will never go back to the old way. More clothes are worn out on the wash board than on your back. I used the magic washing soap as my family increased. Put them to soak overnight, fine ones in one tub, coarse ones in second tub, if bed washing use a third tub. Use 1 cup, magic soap to a pail of water, cover all. In the morning rub lightly on the board, boil, rinse and hang out. When I wash this way I finish at noon. Many women wash all day, and they work faithfully.

EXCELLENT WASHING FLUID
1 pound potash, 1 ounce salts of tartar, 1 ounce of liquid ammonia. Put salts and potash in gallon of water on the stove. When dissolved let cool and add ammonia.

Cork lightly in a jug. Soak clothes over night. In the morning make a strong suds of cold water and 1 cup of fluid to 10 gallons water, put clothes in to nearly fill boiler, boil 10 minutes. Take out, rub lightly, rinse, blue hang out. Use less washing fluid with rain water.

MAGIC WASHING SOAP
To 5 gallons of water add 5 pounds common soap, cut in small pieces, dissolve and store, then add 12 ounces of Borax and 16 ounces of Sal Soda. Stir frequently on stove, over low heat, when all is dissolved pour in vessel to cool. If soft soap is used 10 to 15 pounds will be needed with 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 gallons of water. To use, heat as much soft water to cover the clothing, have it blood warm. To each pail of water add 1 cup of magic soap, dissolve well. Rub soap on the dirty streaks, push down under the water. Cover tub to keep water warm as possible. In five minutes raise clothes up and down, and turn them over, do it several times. Soak in suds 20 to 30 minutes. Then wring them out and put to boil or simmer for 15 minutes. Using 1/2 cup soap to each pail of water. Rinse in two waters and hang up to dry. No washboard is needed. Use the same water for your colored clothes and save it.

IMPERIAL STAR BLUING
Take 1 ounce best prussian blue, pulverized, 1/2 ounce oxalic acid, also pulverized, 1 quart soft water, mix. The acid dissolves the blue and holds it in evenly in water. Use 1 or 2 tablespoons to a tub of water, according to the size of the wash tub. To prevent bluing from spotting the clothes, dissolve the bluing in warm water and have rinse water a little warm.
