

Pink And White Decorates Seuell-Tallman Ceremonies



Baskets of roses and June flowers accented with large pink bows, tall brass candelabras with white bows and pink tapers decorated the Kingman Memorial Presbyterian Church in Adrian for the 3 p.m. wedding ceremonies of Lois Jean Seuell and Timmy Dale Tallman on June 20, 1971.

The Rev. Raymond L. Wilson of the United Presbyterian Church officiated at the double-ring rites in the presence of 225 guests.

The altar was decorated with three single pink candles, two of which were lighted. The bride and groom approached the altar and after extinguishing the two candles, they lit the center candle, which signified their being united as one.

Parents of the newlyweds are Mr. and Mrs. E.M. Seuell and Mr. and Mrs. Keith Tallman, all of rural Adrian.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, chose a formal gown of nylon organza over white satin, fashioned with a high waistline and gathered A-line skirt. The bodice yoke was overlaid with scalloped lace as was the stand-up collar. The long full Bishop sleeves were fashioned of the same nylon organza with five inch deep cuffs of scalloped lace. Her chapel length train of nylon organza, edged with lace was attached to the back bodice with a large satin and lace bow. The bride designed her gown and it was made by Mrs. Mike Sillonis. Her veil of illusion flowed to elbow length and was held to a headpiece of nylon organza, netting and flowers with pearl centers. The bridal bouquet was a cascade of baby pink carnations, orchids and rose colored straw flowers. For something old she wore her great-grandmother's earrings. She also wore the traditional blue garter, an English six-pence in her shoe, given her by a friend and the something borrowed was a petticoat.

Each carried one long stemmed rosebud with white satin streamers.

Following the wedding a reception was held in the church fellowship hall. It was decorated with crepe paper streamers and bells in the bridal colors of pink and white. A three tiered wedding cake, decorated with pink netting, pink bells and lilies of the valley, topped with two white satin bells inside a heart of pearls trimmed in pink lilies of the valley and white net, centered the serving table. Mrs. James R. Nelson and Mrs. Michael Gobler, both sisters of the bridegroom, served the cake. Mrs. Rex Smith presided at the punch bowl. Miss Jane Timmerman served coffee. In charge of the guest book was Miss Gay Morinaka.

For going away the bride wore an electric blue polyester knit pantsuit, and a corsage from her wedding bouquet. After a honeymoon trip to Sun Valley, the couple are at home in Adrian. Rep. Smith Announces Farm Labor Task Force

Oregon House Speaker Robert F. Smith Wednesday announced creation of a House Task Force on Farm Labor.

Rep. Gordon Macpherson, R-Toledo, Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, will chair the special panel.

Other members are Reps. Bob

Stults, R-Roseburg, Ed Patterson, R-LaGrande, Marvin Hollingsworth, D-Troutdale, and Richard Magruder, D-Clatskanie.

Smith said he has directed the Task Force "to begin work immediately drafting an acceptable substitute to Senate Bill

677."

Smith said he believes it is "possible to draft legislation to remove questions of unconstitutionality, while at the same time addressing itself to the legitimate concerns expressed by farmers and farm workers."

He said "the veto of SB 677 has left farmers and farm workers high-and-dry without an acceptable method of solving anticipated farm labor disputes."

Smith said "in my opinion, certain protections must be provided under the law if we hope to escape the chaotic conditions caused by farm labor disputes in California."

Smith said "the Governor has suggested the possible need for a special session should a crisis situation develop. However, I believe we would be remiss in our responsibilities if we wait until chaos is upon us."

He said "it is possible that legislative leaders will petition the Governor to call a one-day special session, limited to this question only, if prior agreement can be reached on a bill and if the necessary commitments are made beforehand."

Smith said "I do not envision the need for a lengthy study, as most of the groundwork has been laid through the hours of work spent drafting and amending SB 677."

"Nor do I envision the need for an agonizing special session lasting more than one day. The bill can be discussed in depth, with all legal questions answered and all points debated prior to the actual convening of a special session."

Smith said he was calling on all interested parties "to make constructive contributions to the Task Force in its attempts to draft acceptable legislation."

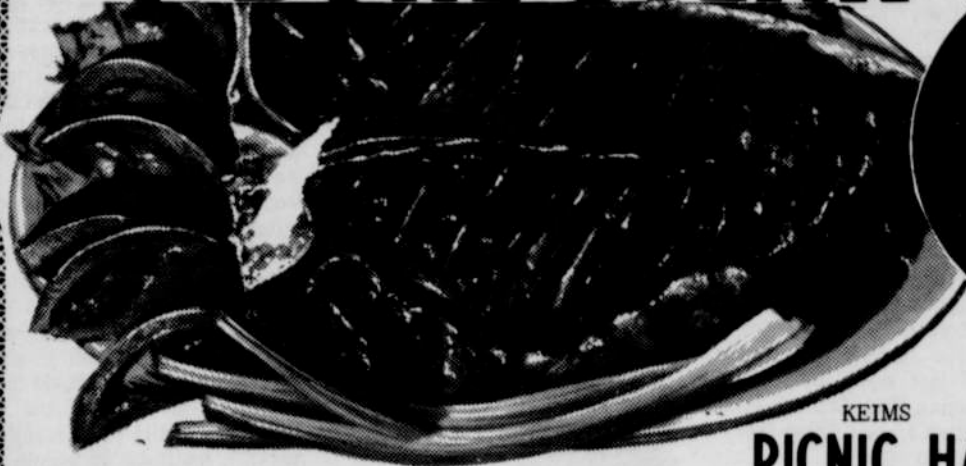
