In a lovely candlelight ceremony, Charlene Frances Morrison became the bride of George Felton Heider, Saturday evening, June 19, 1971 at 7:30 p.m.

Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Morrison, both deceased, and Mr. and Mrs. C.E. Linegar of Rt. 2 Nyssa.

The double-ring ceremony was solemnized by the Rev. Peter Hutton at the Calvin United Presbyterian Church in Corvallis. The bride and groom repeated their vows in the presence of 100 guests. The altar was graced on each side by tall candleabras with garlands

of white gladiolus, blue daisies, greenery and large blue satin bows. Altar flowers were of the same floral combination. The church was decorated with a white aisle cloth and blue satin pew bows.

Providing the wedding music was organist Mrs. Doris Dron-gensen.

The bride was given in marriage by her brother, C. Michael Jones, of Milwaukie, Oregon. For her wedding she chose a floor-length gown, reminiscent of the Romance Era, with bouffant skirt and fitted bodice fashioned of organza and enhanced with overlays of Irish lace. Gulpures of matching lace ac-

cented the high neckline, full chapel train and skirt. She also wore the traditional blue garter. A tiny caplet of organza bows over sprays of stephanotis held the floor-length veil of illusion. Her bridal bouquet was blue daisies and white rosebuds with ribbon streamers, carried on a white Bible.

All wore matching empire waisted gowns of floor-length, with sleeveless dark blue velvet bodice and pale blue whip-cream skirts with matching trains attached at waist. Lighting the blue candles prior to the ceremony were Miss Toqua Linegar and Leslie Linegar. Toqua wore a short dress with long sleeves, in the same color as the other attendants. Her dress was trimmed with white daisies and she wore short white gloves and a corsage of white daisies.

The cake was decorated with blue daisies and white doves and topped with two white doves nestled in lilies of the valley and forget-me-nots. Surrounding the base of the cake was blue fluted lace.

Miss Debra Dunn cut the wedding cake, Miss Paula Loftin poured coffee and Miss Paula Ramirez served punch. Others assisting were Miss Debbie Seamen and Mrs. Phyllis Cross. Miss Sally Githens was in charge of the guest book.

GOV. McCall Appoints Three Man Farm Panel

By executive order, Governor Tom McCall has formed a three-man Farm Labor Relations Panel to determine the means of establishing an orderly process of working with farm labor questions.

Gordon Sloan, 60, former justice of the Oregon Supreme Court, will serve as chairman. Working with him will be Orlando Hollis, 66, former dean of the University of Oregon School of Law; and Lee Johnson, 40, Oregon Attorney General.

The governor's panel was sworn in this morning by Marion County Circuit Judge Val Sloper. The group started their deliberations immediately and scheduled a second meeting for the first of the week.

McCall vetoed Senate Bill 677, the farm labor bill, on unconstitutional grounds, promising early establishment of an examination and recommendation commission to meet "the need for legislation in the area of farm labor relations."

The panel has been instructed to formulate and submit "an effective, equitable, and constitutional measure, establishing a procedure for fair and orderly settlement of disputes between farm workers and their employers."

McCall, in the executive order, urged that the proposal should be given to him at the earliest possible date.

To accomplish the task, the panel is directed to consult representatives of interested groups and to seek whatever technical and legal advice it deems useful.

The panel will continue as a body to be made available for equitable direction in the arbitration of labor disputes, when asked to do so by farm workers and their employers.

In his veto message, McCall pledged total support to his administration to the panel, "including whatever manpower and other resources can be loaned to it within budgetary

limitations by agencies of state government."

McCall's current executive order, creating the panel, states that such a deliberative body "made up of informed, impartial, and respected citizens can best correct the deficiencies in Senate Bill 677, and formulate a regulatory procedure that is effective, equitable, and constitutional."

Sloan, former vice president of the Oregon State Bar, received his law degree at Washington University School of Law in Kansas.

Hollis, a member of the Oregon State and the American Bar Associations, received his undergraduate and his law degrees from the University of Oregon, and was acting president of the University of Oregon in 1944 and 1945.

Johnson, a Princeton graduate and former member of the Oregon Legislature, gained his law degree at Stanford University. He has been Oregon's Attorney General since the 1968 election.

Seat Belt Use Urged

Too many Oregon traffic deaths still involve people who fail to use seat belts, according to the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division.

During the first six months of the year, 287 people were killed in Oregon traffic. Sixty-nine died when thrown from their cars and more than half of them had seat belts in their cars but were not using them when the accidents happened.

Another 85 people died from injuries inside the car that may have been lessened if they had been using the seat belts in the car, the Division said.

The Division reminded that studies have conclusively shown that passengers are five times safer to remain inside their cars at the time of impact than to be thrown from the car. Seat belts, a spokesman said, help keep riders in the car and also help lessen the seriousness of injuries to those remaining inside the car.

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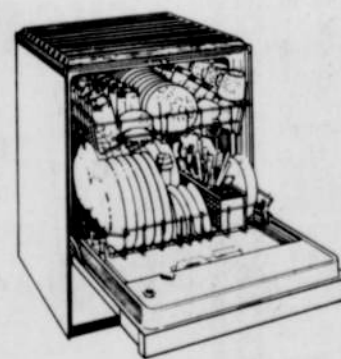
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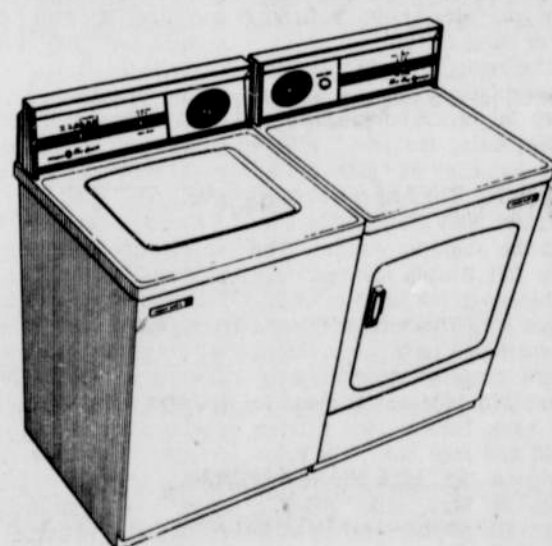
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
