Steens Mountain Recreation Lands To Be Dedicated

Kessler R. Cannon, Assistant to the Governor of Oregon for Natural Resources, will dedicate Steens Mountain Recreation Lands on July 16, 1971.

Archie D. Craft, State Director for the Bureau of Land Management in Oregon, formally designated the 140,607 acres of public lands in Harney County as Steens Mountain Recreation Lands on June 24. The ceremony will take place at Fish Lake Campground, commencing 12:00 noon on Friday, July 16, 1971. The public is invited. Fish Lake Campground is 18 miles east of Frenchglen on the Steens Mountain summit road, 75 miles south-east of Burns.

Participating in the program will be L. Christian Vosler, Burns District Manager, BLM; John W. McKean, Director, Oregon State Game Commission; Robert F. Smith, Speaker of the House, Oregon Legislature; and Charley Otley, representing Otley Brothers, Incorporated.

A luncheon sponsored by the Harney County Cowbelles is being served for a nominal charge at Fish Lake following the dedication. Those planning to attend the luncheon are encouraged to make their reservations prior to July 12. They may do so by contacting the District Manager, Bureau of Land Management, Burns District, 74 South Alvord Street, Burns, Ore., 97720, or by telephone 573-2071.

Identification of Steens Mountain as "recreation lands" formally recognized the area as an important recreation resource. It is an area of unique features. Remote areas and landscapes are wild and natural. The mountain is steep, rugged, and beautiful. The most striking features are the gorges and cirques formed as a result of glacial action.

Only a portion of the area is used by recreationists; much of the area is roadless and pristine in nature. Intermingled with public lands in the Steens Mountain area are some State and private lands. The recreation lands designation will have no effect on other ownerships nor on established uses of public lands.

All BLM lands comprising Steens Mountain Recreation Lands have been classified for retention in Federal ownership and multiple use management. BLM officials note that livestock grazing historically has been an important and productive use on the mountain and will be continued in accordance with carefully integrated, cooperative management plans.

Steens Mountain also has been and will continue to be important as habitat for wildlife. In addition, Donner and Blitzen River and its tributaries on the western slopes of the mountain provide a major water supply to Malheur National Wildlife Refuge, which is just north of Steens Mountain.

State Fair Books Ready

Preparations for the 106th edition of the Oregon State Fair which opens August 28 and runs through Sept. 6 are gearing up as premium books are being mailed to prospective exhibitors this week.

In addition to the complete book which covers all departments, twelve separate categories are covered in individual books for each department. This should prove more convenient to most exhibitors. Thus the lady entering her needlework in the fair does not have to search through all the other department sections to find the Home Economics section.

The size and scope of the BIG ONE increases every year and indications are that this year will be no exception. Last year 10,537 entries, not including the Horse Show, were judged.

Most entries close August 1, and must be postmarked by midnight of that date. Exceptions are the Art Show which closes August 8, and the Photo Salon which closes August 11.

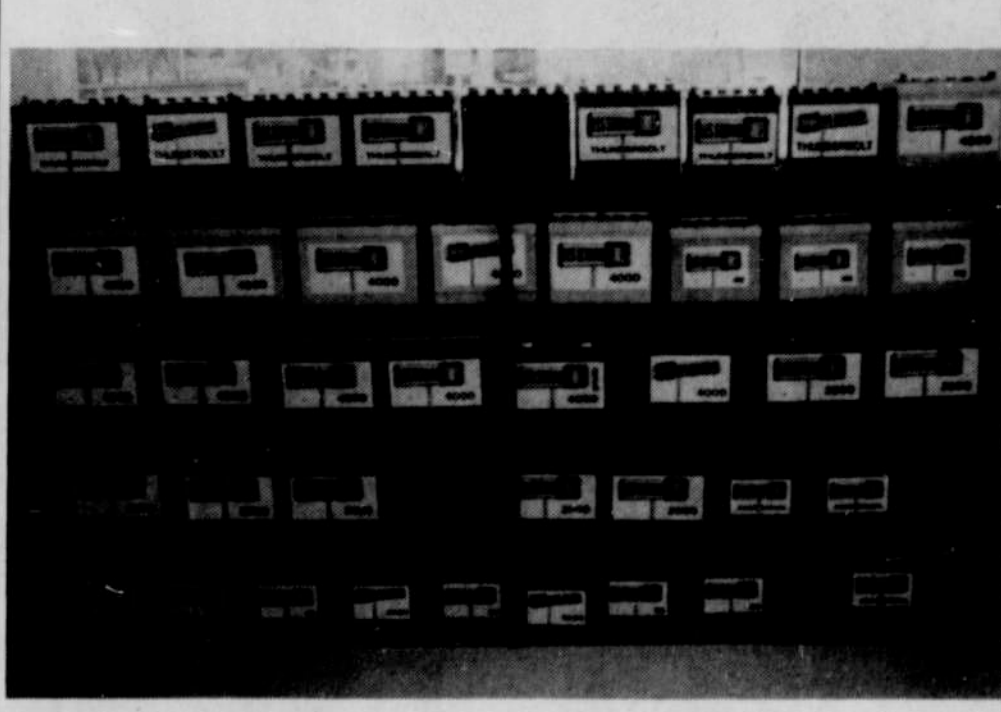

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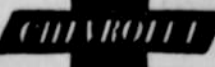
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
