Trout By Air

The annual aerial planting of trout in Oregon's high lakes got underway July 13 and, if flying weather cooperates, the aerial fish drops will be completed by July 23, according to Teino Koski, fishery biologist who heads the Game Commission's fish planting program.

Flight operations began at the Klamath Falls airstrip for planting lakes in the south Cascades and will be transferred to the Fall River airstrip for aerial drops into central and north Cascade lakes.

Aerial flights into the Elkhorn and Wallowa mountains may be delayed for several weeks as many lakes at high elevations remain ice-covered the result of the late spring. When these open up, flights will originate from the Joseph and Baker airfields.

About 400 isolated lakes will be stocked with 650,000 fingerling trout. The bulk of these fish are brook trout although some lakes will be stocked with rainbow and cutthroat.

A total of 775 high mountain lakes are on the Commission's aerial stocking list. Depending on angling pressure and size, some lakes are stocked every year, some every two years, and others at three or four-year intervals.

Razor Clam Season Closes

The Fish Commission of Oregon today reminded all

razor clam enthusiasts that sports and commercial digging of razor clams north of Tillamook Head in Clatsop County closed as of July 15 and will remain closed through August

31. This regulation is in effect to prevent the wastage of newly set small clams, and allow for a growing period to provide a carry-over of large clams for the following season.

Oregon's beaches yield over one million razor clams each year to 60,000 diggers. Although Oregon's razor clams appear to be holding their own against this massive onslaught,

protection of the resource demands conservation laws that are enforced and obeyed by all diggers. Wastage of razor clams in a single year has run as high as one-half million

clams or almost one-third of the harvest. Since the razor clam closure was begun in 1967, wastage of clams has been significantly reduced.
