### WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

Planning a picnic? To be sure it has a happy ending, keep perishable foods in a cooler well supplied with ice.

Meats, egg-rich foods including salads, desserts with cream or custard fillings and meringue pies must be kept cold to prevent bacterial growth.

Perishable foods held at room temperature over two hours may not be safe to eat.

Water sensitive wall paper may be cleaned with one of the commercial dough type cleaners. Follow the directions on the label.

Our Extension offices get many calls for a formula for a cleaner that can be made at home. Here is one recipe. Stir 4 teaspoons baking soda into 2 cups flour, then add 1/2 tablespoons of household ammonia and 1 1/2 cups water. Beat the mixture until smooth. Steam in a double boiler for 1 1/2 hours. Then leave the dough covered and when cool enough to handle knead until smooth and soft.

Use about one-third of the dough rolled into a ball and rub on the wall with overlapping strokes to prevent streaking. Keep working the soiled part of the dough to the inside so that a clean surface side of the dough rubs against the wall.

### USAF's First Woman General



Brigadier General Jeanne M. Holm became the U.S. Air Force's first woman general officer July 16. As Director of Women in the Air Force (WAF), she is first to point out that the acronym WAF is no longer meaningful. "It implies a separate group or corps of women, and we aren't . . . we are members of the United States Air Force and it is coeducational."

### Onion Quality Regulations Issued

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced minimum quality requirements for onions grown under the Idaho-Eastern Oregon Federal marketing order. Shipments of all yellow and white varieties grown in the area must be at least "moderately cured," effective July 17 through Aug. 31, 1971. Imports of these varieties must meet the same requirement beginning July 20.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said these requirements will assist producers in orderly marketing and to keep inferior onions from reaching consumers.

The Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act requires that imports of specific commodities, including onions, meet requirements in effect for domestic shipments under Federal marketing orders.

The regulations will be published in the Federal Register July 17. Copies are available from the Fruit and Vegetable Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250.

### Sen. Packwood Wants Pumice Mining Banned

Hearings on his bill to ban mining in the Three Sisters Wilderness have been scheduled for September 13 and 14, Senator Bob Packwood (R-Ore.) announced Thursday.

Hearings will be held before the Senate Subcommittee on Minerals, Materials and Fuels of the Interior Committee, chaired by Senator Frank Moss (D-Utah).

Under the Wilderness Act of 1964, mining is legal in wilderness areas. The law states that persons with valid mining claims must be permitted access to their claims. Packwood's bill, cosponsored by Senator Mark O. Hatfield (R-Ore.), however, would specifically ban any type of mining in the Three Sisters Wilderness, effective immediately when the bill is signed into law.

Packwood introduced his legislation in early March as a result of his concern by reports that a Los Angeles firm plans to mine block pumice in the Sisters.

"This is good news for the people in the Three Sisters area," Packwood said when Senator Moss told him hearings had been scheduled.

"We must not stop here, but must concentrate our efforts to make certain the Sisters is not needlessly stripped of its beauty. We simply can't afford to sacrifice one of our few remaining wilderness areas to mine such a low-material value as pumice," he added.

Packwood also said he plans to hold informal hearings on the issue when he visits Deschutes County in mid-August, in preparation for the hearings in Washington in September.

Packwood also has introduced a bill which would restrict mining to that of strategic and critical materials in all national wilderness areas. Hearings have not been scheduled on this bill, but Packwood has voiced hope that hearings would be scheduled soon.
