Cascade Gas Seeks Increase

Cascade Natural Gas Corporation has asked the Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner for rate increases in Oregon to produce \$1,270,950 in additional annual gross revenue.

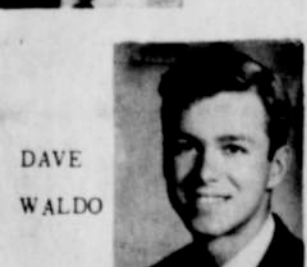
The petition filed July 13 seeks added revenue to bring the company's rate of return up to 8.9%.

"This is the first general rate increase to improve Cascade's rate of return in 13 years," declared O. Marshall Jones, president. "Increased costs of labor, materials and money borrowed have made this action imperative. Needed large capital expenditures in the future require better earnings in order to obtain necessary financing."

The new rates will represent an approximate 20% increase in cost to the average customer. The company filed a similar request in the state of Washington on June 2.

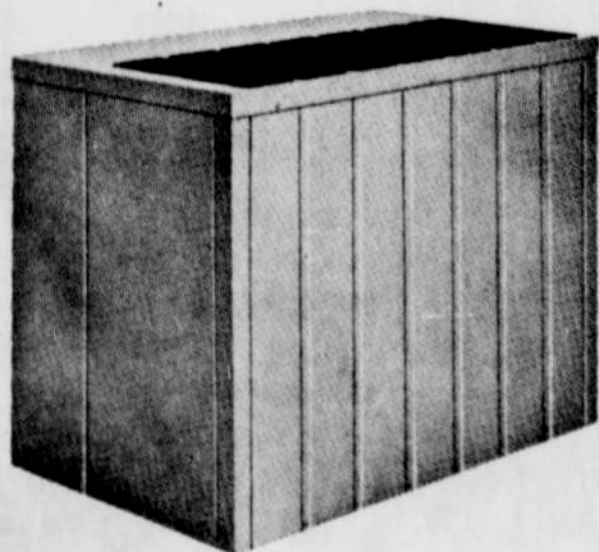
