Richard C. Babcock, Jr., 32, 1229 College Green Place, Ontario, a victim of kidney failure, has been admitted to the life-saving treatment program of the Kidney Association of Oregon. He has started a 10-week training and treatment period on an artificial kidney machine at the KAO-supported center at Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland.

Prior to entering the KAO program, he underwent a screening to determine his medical and psychological suitability for training and home artificial kidney machine treatments.

During the 10-week period at the hospital, he will receive "runs" on an artificial kidney machine three times a week, which will cleanse his blood of impurities, the function of normal, healthy kidneys. He will also learn the function and operation of his machine so that

he will be able to use it in his home when he returns to Ontario.

Babcock plans to return to work after his home treatments start. He is general manager for K-G Retail, Inc., men's apparel store in Ontario. His wife, Elizabeth, is a housewife. They are the parents of three sons: Bernard, 8; Brian, 5; and Richard, 3.

Babcock was graduated from the Natrona County High School in Casper, Wyo., and attended Casper Junior College. He played professional baseball with the Milwaukee Braves in Wisconsin for two years and served on active duty with the U. S. Army between 1956 and 1962. He is a member of the Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Ontario.

He is one of more than two dozen Oregonians accepted into the Kidney Association of Oregon program. Money needed for his training and treatment for the first six months is about \$10,000. Thereafter, the cost is approximately \$4,000 per year, according to the Kidney Association.

In order to give financial support to Babcock and the other KAO patients around the state and to expand the program to admit other new patients during 1971, the Kidney Association depends upon financial assistance provided by the State of Oregon Department of

NASA Inspection Team To Visit Oregon Sites

Governor Tom McCall announced today that a site inspection team from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Air Force will be in Oregon July 28 to look at possible sites for the space shuttle base.

The governor said NASA has indicated an interest in two possible sites - the 100,000 acre Boardman site under lease to the Boeing Company, and a site in southeastern Malheur County.

Approximately 60,000 acres will be needed for the space shuttle base, and some 3,000 people would be employed at the proposed facility, the governor said.

McCall said he believes use of the Boardman site for the space shuttle facility would be compatible with the agricultural-nuclear-industrial development planned by the Boeing

Vocational Rehabilitation and a \$150,000 statewide public drive.
