

Sen. Packwood Will Visit 18 Counties In August

Senator Bob Packwood (R-Ore) announced he would visit 18 Oregon counties during the period of August 9-27.

The Senator plans to fly to Portland on August 6 after Congress has adjourned for the August recess. He will hold a news conference at the Congress Hotel in downtown Portland, August 7 at 11 a.m.

Packwood begins his Oregon swing on Monday, August 9, with visits to Sherman, Gilliam and Morrow Counties. Stops in Umatilla, Union, Baker and Walla Walla Counties rounds out the first week's schedule.

The second week includes Malheur, Grant, Wheeler, Crook, Deschutes and Jefferson Counties.

The third week begins with

Klamath County and ends with Marion County, with stops in Josephine, Jackson and Lane Counties.

In several of the counties, the Senator will hold "Problems, People and Packwood" sessions where constituents can come and discuss their problems with him.

On August 20, in Madras County, Packwood will spend the afternoon touring the Warm Springs Indian Reservation and conferring with tribal leaders.

Two other highlights include an August 18 train ride from Prineville to Madras with dinner being served on the train, and an ice cream social in Klamath Falls, August 23. The ice cream, packaged under the label "Packwood Plum Wonderful," is being provided free by a Klamath Falls dairy.

In Bend, on August 19, Packwood will hear testimony from interested citizens on his Three Sisters bill which seeks to prevent mining in the Three Sisters area of the Deschutes and Willamette National Forest.

Packwood plans to return to Washington on September 7 after making some other appearances in the Portland and Eugene areas.

The Malheur County visit will be on Monday, August 16, with the schedule as follows:

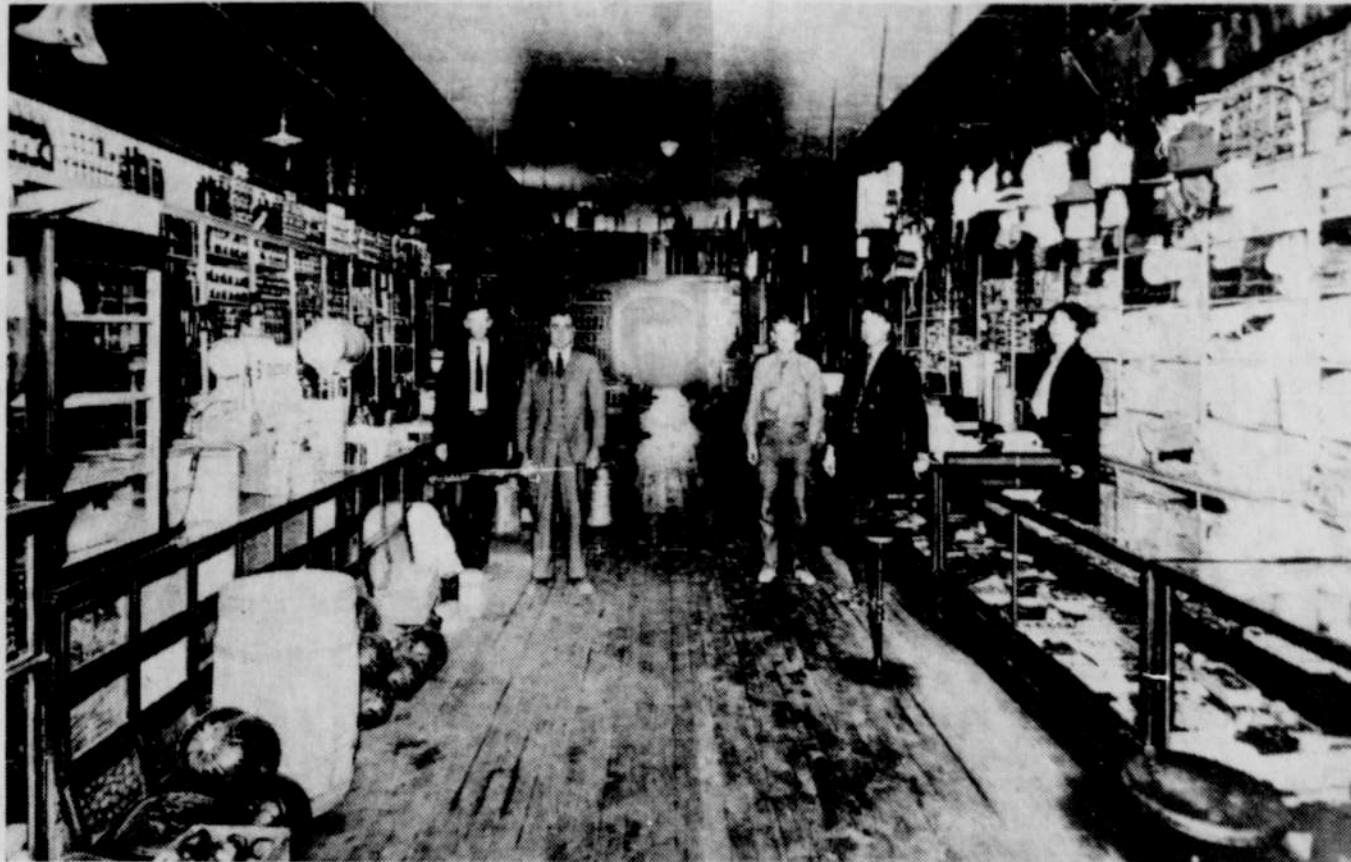

Aluminum Can Recycling Program Now Underway

With the advent of three more leading brewers into the all-aluminum beverage container, Reynolds Metals Company is predicting its aluminum can recycling and reclamation program in Oregon will gain swift momentum.

Recently, Blitz-Weinhard, Carling, including its Heidelberg brand, and Olympia adopted the seamless aluminum can, bringing to a majority the number of beers available to Oregonians in the recyclable aluminum container. Blitz-Weinhard, Budweiser, Carling, Hamm's, Heidelberg, Michelob, Miller's, Olympia and Rainier are the beers now packaged in aluminum cans which can be redeemed for 10 cents per pound at 97 redemption centers in Oregon.

Reynolds Metals inaugurated its aluminum can reclamation and recycling program in Oregon in mid-April with cooperating beverage wholesalers and Reynolds Troutdale, Oregon, plant acting as redemption centers. Originally, 37 such centers were set up, but with the advent of more brewers into the aluminum container, the number of state-wide centers has been increased to 97.

They are located in Albany, Astoria, Baker, Beaverton, Bend, Burns, Canyon City, Cascade Locks, Coos Bay, Corvallis, Eugene, Grants Pass, Hillsboro, Hood River, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Lakeview, Medford, McMinnville, Newport, North Bend, Nyssa, Ontario, Oregon City, Pendleton, Portland, Roseburg, Salem, Springfield, St. Helens, The Dalles, Tillamook, Troutdale and Warrenton.

Since April 15, Reynolds has been able to reclaim and recycle more than 40 tons of all-aluminum cans turned in by Pacific Northwest residents.

"We expect the volume to increase rapidly as the impact of the new brewers into the

program begins to be felt," W.E. Campbell, Reynolds plant manager at Troutdale, said.

Campbell said the all-aluminum beverage can is easily recognizable. It has no bottom or side seam, is rounded at the bottom, and non-magnetic.

Cans of other materials are using aluminum lids, so an aluminum lid does not necessarily mean the entire can is aluminum, which is a lighter weight container than other types of beverage cans.

Aluminum can collectors should call Owyhee Distributing Company at Nyssa for information. They will receive cans on Monday and Thursdays.

OREGON HIGHWAY VOLUME INCREASES

Traffic volume on most of Oregon's highways showed an increase in May, 1971, compared to May, 1970, according to the monthly report compiled by the Oregon State Highway Division.

A summary of the permanent traffic recorder data for rural and urban state highways showed an increase of 7.4 percent in vehicular traffic in May, 1971, compared to May, 1970.

The first five months of 1971 showed an increase of 6.1 percent in vehicular traffic compared to the first five months of 1970.
