**To Take Care Of Your Yard Take Care Of Your Tools**

Accidents around the home cause millions of injuries every year and many of them happen out in the yard. Rakes, shovels, hoses, ladders and other equipment should always be stored after they're used.  
 When using any type of power equipment, the manufacturer's instructions for proper operation and maintenance must be followed carefully to avoid accidents. Although any tool, powered or not, can be hazardous if used incorrectly, most new power tools have



safety design features. Typical is the new line of Disston cordless lawn care products--three models of grass shears and an innovative hedge trimmer.

The housings of all these tools are made of the same type of strong, high impact synthetic materials used for football helmets. Switches are spring-loaded to automatically shut off when pressure is released, and can be locked in the "off" position when the tools aren't being used.

Because the tools are powered by rechargeable batteries, the possibility of getting shocked while using them is eliminated. The cordless lawn care tools come with complete recharging units that plug into ordinary electrical outlets.

**Work Smarter --- Not Harder**

Before you go on vacation, check up on your appliances. To avoid running the risk of finding that bugs vacation in your home, clean appliances thoroughly and get rid of crumbs and spills.  
 Clean the oven, electric can opener and toaster. Wash off interior refrigerator walls while you dispose of perishables that won't be edible when you return. Run cold water through the waste disposal for several minutes after it is last used to thoroughly flush away any food particles.  
 The main job of parents during a child's growing-up period is to work themselves out of a job. This means a gradual release of control as the child grows to the point that he is able to take responsibility for his own behavior.  
 Letting go is a fine art and a difficult one for a parent to master. The important thing is for a child to have the security of parental controls until he masters his own inner self-control.  
 The cutting edge of an electric can opener needs regular cleaning after each use. Of course, it can't be immersed in water but should be wiped clean with a damp cloth to avoid possible food contamination. On some models the cutting wheel can be removed for cleaning. Check your instruction booklet for the easiest way to keep your particular can opener clean.  
 For women who don't like ironing: Why not do some of it in the dryer? Permanent press garments that become wrinkled due to improper handling or long packing in a suitcase can be put in the dryer with a clean wet sponge. Tumble for five to 10 minutes. The moisture and the heat will remove the wrinkles, but garments should be hung as soon as they come from the dryer.  
 Discarded refrigerators are hazards for children. In spite of all the warnings regarding removal of doors or other precautions, 17 children died by suffocation in 1970 because of entrapment in old refrigerators. This happens mainly in the spring and summer. Seventy per cent of the deaths are children 3 to 6 years of age. Boys outnumber girls 2.5 to 1.  
 If you're getting a new refrigerator, be sure your old one isn't left where it can be a hazard. Try to keep children away from refrigerators discarded by others.  
 Home sewers are finding new fabrics, new threads and equipment call for a little ingenuity. One question often asked is-- "How can the light weight plastic spools be kept on the spindle of the sewing machine?" She suggests placing an empty bobbin, a washer or a drapery weight on top of the spool. When winding a bobbin, hold spool in place with finger lightly pressing top of spool.  
 Do not use an old refrigerator shelf for a barbecue grill, at least not if you want to stay healthy. Some refrigerator shelves are coated with cadmium. The cadmium is liable to melt and strike the food. This coating is poisonous and can cause death. Be sure to use a regular barbecue grill and you can be sure you will still be around for next summer's barbecuing.  
 Be a wise shopper. Take cereals for instance, there is considerable variation in prices.  
 Cooked whole grain cereals such as oatmeal and whole wheat give the most value for the money. Quick cooking rolled oats in a 42 ounce package cost about 1 1/2 cents a serving. However, it's 5 cents a serving when bought in individual packages.  
 Sugar coated cereals cost from 1 to 3 cents more per serving than the same type without sugar.  
 Cereals enriched with minerals and vitamins beyond the whole grain levels are nearly twice as costly as those which have nutrients restored only to the original level.  
 Those that are novelty shaped, sugar coated, and may contain small amounts of dried fruit and a surprise toy, are most expensive. You pay 7 or 8 cents a serving for those compared with 3 cents for the same kind of cereal minus sugar and toy.
