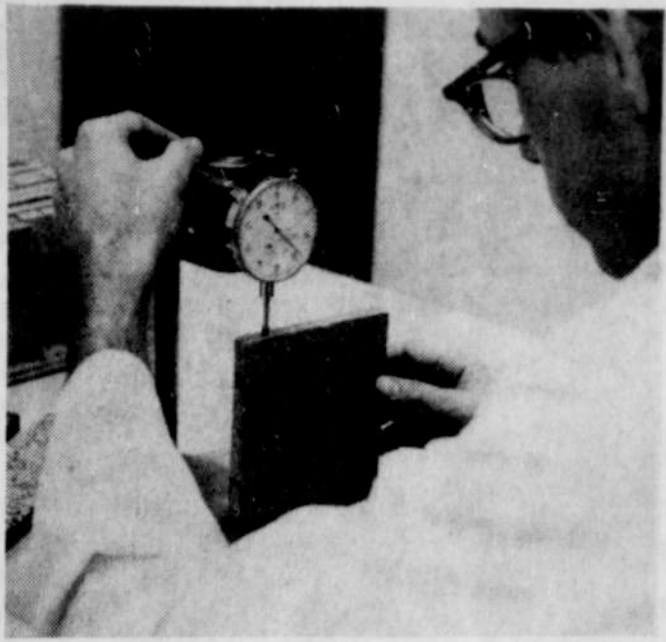




A possible use for sludge? -- University of Washington graduate student Alan M. Stiehler determines the volume of an experimental insulation board containing pulp mill clarifier sludge as part of a moisture absorption test. Dozens sludge-containing board samples have been made in the industry-sponsored research project aimed at identifying a board suitable for trial mill production. The investigation is one of several contract research projects of the Northeast Pulp and Paper Association in a continuing program to investigate better uses and re-uses of resources. Two Northwest forest products firms already have indicated interest in further development of sludge-containing insulation board and hardboard for commercial production.

TIPS FOR THE NEW HOME BUYER

"Once again we are in the midst of what the average American homeowner considers the perfect time to make a housing switch," says Kent Stoner of the Allstate Insurance Companies. The design of a new house should provide four very basic and necessary qualities for its occupants. The house should have ample room for living, sleeping, working and playing. If all four characteristics are present, the house has most likely been constructed with the elements of good design.

Allstate points out that determining good construction of a house is often a problem to a buyer. In this situation the buyer should investigate the builder. Checking with owners of similar houses constructed by the builder usually reveals a good indication of his product integrity.

Foundation walls, drainage systems, exterior walls, windows and exterior doors, the basement and roof are some of the more obvious details which should be inspected before reaching a final decision.

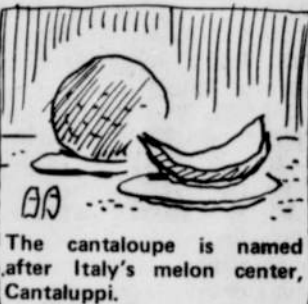
Bill Webb, George Cartwright and Vern Parker went fishing Friday at Fish Lake in the Blue Mountains and returned home Sunday evening.

ULLMAN ASKS END TO RAIL STRIKE

Voting against any moves by Congress to recess August 6, Congressman Al Ullman said today it would be inexcusable if Congress goes home without resolving the railroad dispute.

Ullman said he was preparing legislation and would do everything possible to get early action.

Noting that 10 railroads have now been struck, he also said he felt the administration had no excuses for not taking more positive steps to restore service.

"Oregon's economy is in a state of paralysis. It's grossly unfair to penalize a specific geographic region," Ullman said.

I will attempt to prevent any congressional recess, he said, while this economic devastation is allowed to go on unchecked.

Ullman contacted both President Nixon and Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe July 23 asking them to take emergency action to restore rail freight service.

At the same time he called on Rep. Harley Staggers, (D-W.V.), and Sen. Warren Magnuson, (D-Wash.), to prepare a legislative approach to the labor-management dispute. Staggers chairs the Commerce Committee in the House, and Magnuson heads the Senate Commerce Committee.

Bake Now—Freeze For Later



How does the busy woman manage to serve homemade breads and cookies? She bakes when she has the time and freezes the goodies for use at busy times.

This dark golden quick bread freezes particularly well. There are two unusual ingredients: finely rolled NABISCO Shredded Wheat biscuits add crunch texture and coarse-cut orange marmalade adds tangy orange flavor.

To freeze, cool loaf and wrap in aluminum foil. Unwrap and let thaw at room temperature before serving.

ORANGE WHEAT BREAD

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground mace
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 cup milk
5 NABISCO Shredded Wheat biscuits, finely rolled (about 1 1/2 cups)
3 eggs
1/2 cup coarse-cut orange marmalade
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted

Sift together first five ingredients; add sugar and mix well. Pour milk over NABISCO Shredded Wheat biscuits crumbs. Beat together eggs and marmalade; stir in butter. Add to dry ingredients together with shredded wheat mixture; mix until blended. Pour into a well greased 9 x 5-inch loaf pan. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (375° F.) 1 to 1 1/2 hours, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes in pan, then remove. Cool overnight before slicing. Makes 1 (9-inch) loaf.
