

Kelly LaFay Places Second At McCall

Kelly LaFay, son of Mrs. Kay LaFay, placed second in the 1971 McCall Amateur Golf Tournament last weekend in the men's championship flight. LaFay was a stalwart on Nyssa High School's golf team for the past three years, and was second place winner in the State AA High School Tournament in Portland last spring.



The Nyssa High School athlete was defeated by Rob O'Neil of San Francisco 3-2 in the 36-hole championship round. LaFay had previously eliminated Zimmerman of Pasco, Wash., last year's winner, in the quarter-finals Friday, and beat Collins, Boise, in the semi-finals Saturday. O'Neil is a two-time past winner of the annual McCall event, which attracts outstanding amateur golfers from many parts of the country.

Clinic Aug. 18

Football season is right around the corner, and already certified gridiron officials in the state of Oregon are attending training sessions and brushing up on the rules.

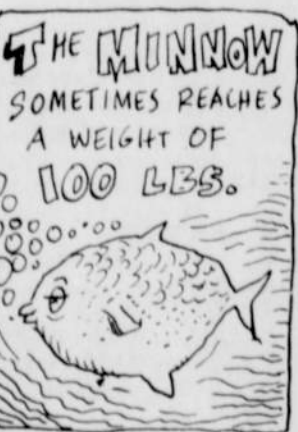
Carlyle Staab, acting commissioner of the Baker Football Officials Association, has announced that the Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) sponsored rules clinic will be held Wednesday, August 18, at Baker High School beginning at 7:30 p.m. Staab reported that Dr. Edward Ryan, OSAA associate executive secretary and a member of the National Alliance Football Rules Committee, will present the clinic.

Included in Dr. Ryan's presentation will be a half-hour film entitled "Football by the Rules." He also will cover the rules changes made by the committee at its annual meeting last January.

The average fan will notice few changes in the high school rules this year. The National Alliance Committee, which is composed of representatives from the National Federation of State High School Associations, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics and the National Junior College Athletic Association felt that the game is quite stable with the rules book presenting a balance between offense and defense.

One change that will be noticeable is the fact that the cross bar between the goal posts has been extended in length from 18 feet to 23 feet, 4 inches. This widening of the posts has been optional the past two years but becomes mandatory this season. Also, no decorations will be permitted on the cross bar or the part of each goal post above the cross bar.
