### Charbonneau Rites Attended By Nyssans

The dedication ceremonies of the grave site of Jean Baptiste Charbonneau son of the famed Sacajawea held Friday, August 6, near Jordan Valley was attended by M. and Mrs. E. Otis Smith and Jake Fischer. Fischer represented the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Smith said it is well worth the time to visit the grave site, stating that the area is fenced with a rustic type enclosure with a large historical marker upon which is the story of Charbonneau. The grave is an area set off with chain links and has a granite stone national DAR marker erected on the grave site. The Oregon Historical Society also has a historical marker upon which are the names of the other graves.

Four years ago, Irl Nolan and his Language-Arts class (students who are now this year's seniors at Nyssa High School) made this trip 15 miles southwest of Jordan Valley to the Charbonneau grave site to place a marker as a creative interest project on Oregon History. The group also took slide pictures and made extensive reports on Jean Baptiste Charbonneau at that time.

### Nyssa Woman Participates In New England Conference

Many important issues are being discussed during this week's IRAS (Institute on Religion in an Age of Science) Conference at Star Island, N.H. The theme is "Conflicts of Values and Sources of Power: Options for Religion and Science in a Time of Social Crisis." Of special concern is how a person uses any of his virtues, how he relates to his fellow man and to society.

Participating in the conference is Mrs. Jan Barton of Rt. 2, Nyssa, a public welfare administrator, who is editor of the "Star Beacon", this conference's daily news bulletin.

Today many people of science and religion are moving from a position of only thinking to one of actual action. This conference is aiming at assisting the participants to a clearer understanding of the nature of value development and of how such values are converted to appropriate and effective action. Morals and relative social/cultural contexts are being stressed, as are various political influences.

The roster of speakers includes: Lawrence Kohlberg, Professor of Education, Harvard; Geoffrey Cowan, a public interest lawyer with the Center for Law and Social Policy in Washington D.C.; Donald Szanthe Harrington, senior minister of the Community Church in New York and chairman of the N.Y. Liberal Party; Sanborn Brown, a physicist and associate dean at MIT; Donald Ottenberg, a medical director in Philadelphia, especially involved with drug addiction and alcoholism. In addition it is hoped that William Stringfellow, the noted attorney, author, and lay Episcopal theologian, will be able to make it to the island for Friday's program. Each day contains a two hour morning address and discussion session, an hour in the afternoon devoted to various small

group activities (a dozen different groups discussing such varied topics as war resistance, physical fitness, and homosexuality), and an hour's evening discussion, as a follow-up to the morning address.

In addition, participants have ample opportunity for swimming, fishing, tennis, softball, arts and crafts, enjoying incredible sunsets (and sunrises for those ambitious souls), and becoming acquainted with the lore and legends of the islands.

Star Island serves as the center of activity for the Isles of Shoals, a paradise of nine islands floating some ten miles off shore from Portsmouth, N.H. A century ago they shined on such summer guests as John Greenleaf Whittier, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, Nathaniel Hawthorne, and Franklin Pierce. Shoals history is spiced with fishing villages, murders, pirates, treasures, and ghosts, and today with religious, educational and family conferences.
