

Vale Dairyman Elected Milk Board Chairman

Joe S. (Scottie) Payne, Vale dairyman, has been named chairman of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission, it is announced by Ray Kozak, executive secretary.

George Gilman of Medford was elected vice chairman and Harvey Skov of Portland was reelected secretary-treasurer. Payne succeeds Frank Rood of Coos Bay whose term on the commission had expired. Gilman succeeds Cecil Johnson of Grants Pass, whose term also expired.

Payne operates an 80-acre dairy farm near Vale and milks 70 registered Guernsey cows. In addition to the post on the dairy commission, he is a member of the Malheur County Fair Board, an officer in the Malheur County Dairy Herd Improvement Association and past member of the Oregon Guernsey Breeders Association. He also is a former board member of the Oregon Dairy Council.

Gilman is president of the Jackson County Farm Bureau, member of the Jackson County Planning Commission's advisory board and a past director of the Oregon Dairymen's Association and the Oregon Beef Council. He operates a 70-acre farm outside Medford and milks 230 Holsteins.

Skov, plant production manager for Carnation Company in Portland, is the processor representative on the commission. He is a director of Oregon Dairy Industries and a member of the air and water pollution committee of Associated Oregon Industries.

The Oregon Dairy Products Commission, one of the state's 13 commodity commissions, represents more than 3,200 Oregon dairymen.

Police Science Course Expands

By the beginning of fall term 1971, it is likely that the door to a four year B.S. degree will be opened for Treasure Valley Community College Law Enforcement graduates.

According to Earl McCollum, Director of Occupational Education, Eastern Oregon College is finalizing a social science degree program which will allow transfer of a full two years of police science credits for all Treasure Valley graduates. Theory courses would apply directly while lab and field courses would be accepted as electives. McCollum cautioned, however, that blanket credit transfer will apply only to those holding the A.S. degree. Others will have their transcripts screened course by course.

Dr. Carlos Easley, Eastern Oregon Dean of Instruction is the innovator of the idea. Although he is awaiting approval from the State, Easley said he had assurance from the Chancellor's office that the program would be operative by fall quarter.

New Laws On Drunk Driving

The effective date for two new laws aimed at drinking drivers is still about a month away, but convictions for that charge already are far ahead of last year, according to the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division.

During the first seven months of this year, 4,636 convictions for driving while under the influence have been reported by Oregon courts to DMV. That's 1,203 of 35 per cent, more than for the same period last year.

The 35 per cent increase in driving while under the influence convictions compares with a two per cent increase in all types of traffic convictions. Total convictions for the seven month period number 23,987.

The two new laws that will take effect September 9 will make things even harder on those who drink too much and then drive. One will lower the legal level for a presumption of being under the influence from 0.15 per cent to 0.10; the other will provide for a stiffer penalty for those driving with a blood alcohol reading of 0.15 or more. The penalty will be a jail sentence of not less than six days nor more than one year, or a fine of not more than \$2,000, or both.

The increase in driving while under the influence convictions so far this year is attributed to stepped-up enforcement in Portland, where a federally-funded alcohol countermeasures project is underway, and by the State Police.

If you want a real winner in the "punch line", make Fruit Slush Punch". It stars at receptions and the children love it.

The reason it's a favorite with me is because I can make it, pour it into freezer containers, and relax on the punch until I want to use it. Be sure this punch thaws only to a slush. It furnishes the ice in the 7-Up. (I use a potato masher to slush it.)

FRUIT SLUSH PUNCH
1 - #2 can pineapple juice
1 - 12 oz. can frozen orange juice
1 - 12 oz. can frozen lemonade

3 bananas, mashed
2 cups sugar
4 cups water
2 tbsp. lime juice
3 tbsp. lemon juice
Mix thoroughly and freeze. When ready to serve thaw to a mush and add 4 quarts of 7-Up. Serves 25.
