Yturri Named To Committee

Sen. Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario, Friday was named to serve on the Legislative Counsel Committee by Senate President John D. Burns.

The Legislative Counsel Committee is directed by law to conduct a continuous substantive law revision program and to establish the Law Improvement Committee to supervise the program.

Burns praised Yturri's record of "sound legislative accomplishments" and said Yturri has "one of the finest legal minds in the country."

Yturri, a Republican Leader who has been nominated for President of the Oregon State Senate, is serving his fourth four-year term in the Senate. He has continuously held key assignments and during the past two sessions served as chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee. In the last session he was also a member of the committees on Criminal Law and Procedure and Highways.

Yturri also has served as Chairman of the Criminal Law Revision Commission since it was created by the Legislature in 1967.

Other members of the Legislative Counsel Committee are Senate President John D. Burns, House Speaker Robert F. Smith, Representatives Jack Anusson, R-Salem; Sid Bazett, R-Grants Pass; Fritz Chuiard, R-Portland; Harvey Akeson, D-Portland; and Jack Craig D-Eugene. Sen. Harry Boivin, D-Klamath Falls, will serve as alternate to Burns and Rep. Donald Stathos, R-Jacksonville, will serve as Smith's alternate. Senators George Wingard R-Eugene and Edward Fadeley, D-Eugene were also appointed to the committee.

TVCC BUSINESS HEAD RESIGNS

The resignation of Norman Millikin, Treasure Valley Community College Business Department Chairman, was announced today by Dean Edwin Haynes. Millikin, his wife, Vicki, and three children will move to Bozeman, Montana shortly where he will join the faculty of Montana State University. MSU is the state's largest higher education institution with an enrollment of 7500.



His new duties as Assistant Professor of Business Education will involve him with student teachers in the field of distributive education. During the summer, he will teach graduate professional classes to returning teachers. Also, since the university offers a doctoral program, he plans to pursue that degree in the next few years. Millikin came to Treasure Valley Community College as an instructor in business in 1966. He assumed the chairmanship of the department in the fall of 1968. In 1969 he took his MBE degree at Oregon State University.

Regarding the resignation, Edwin Haynes said, "Norm Millikin has been a key department chairman. He has made significant contributions to the entire institution while building an excellent business division. A man of his qualities must be missed next year."

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NYSSA SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS ARE READY FOR OPENING AUGUST 30

Superintendent W. L. McPartland told the Nyssa Lions Club Tuesday noon what many who have had occasion to visit school in the summertime know, and that is that this has been an extremely busy summer for Nyssa school district custodians.

The most obvious improvement has been the replacement of the old bleachers on the football field with 22 new 18 foot bleachers, each with seven rows of seats and built of steel with 12 inch planks for seats and footrests. These bleachers were constructed entirely by NYC National Youth Corps student workers, with federal funds, and the only cost to the school district was for the salary of Don Breshears, who supervised the construction, and the cost of materials. Comparable bleachers would cost \$12,320 from a sports equipment firm, according to McPartland, but were constructed for under \$4,000 cost to the district.

A major rebuilding job was accomplished at the Elementary School, where the foundation under twelve classrooms was torn out and replaced. McPartland said that for several years concrete floors have been buckling in these rooms, and it was finally determined that moisture and alkali soil was causing the trouble. This summer Holcomb Construction Company tore out these old floors, rebuilt the foundation and provided for proper drainage, and replaced the concrete floors.

Custodial crews under head custodian Del Maggard replaced four new ceilings with acoustical tile in the Elementary School, plus a section of hallway and the office in the High School. This practice, the superintendent said, has been going on for some years. As the old plaster ceilings have cracked and deteriorated they have been renewed with the tile, which not only adds to the attractiveness of the classroom, but the acoustical tile has done much to reduce the noise in these rooms.

Another large ceiling project was in the Primary Building, where the Morrison Electric Company installed an extra row of fluorescent lights in each classroom. A solid

roof had been constructed on this building last summer, McPartland said, to replace plastic skylights which were deteriorating and leaking. This of course cut down on the natural light which entered the classroom, so new lights have been added.

The usual floor maintenance has been accomplished, with custodial crews stripping, cleaning and waxing what amounts to 4 1/2 acres of floor space. Many rooms have been repainted, a new irrigation well was dug, and the old gym painted to help keep the large educational plant in good repair, both inside and out.

McPartland said that now everything is in readiness for the start of school next week, as he paid special tribute to the custodial staff and their young helpers for an excellent summer's work.

Principal Lists School Supplies

Melvin Munn, Nyssa Elementary Principal, has asked the Journal to publish a list of school supplies needed. All students, both boys and girls, must have tennis shoes for physical education classes. The child's name should be printed on each shoe for easy identification. Zipper-type notebooks are not recommended for elementary students. Regulation pens will be available at school. Pupils are asked not to bring fountain pens.

Needed Supplies Listed:
GRADE 1 - The \$1.75 registration fee will pay all school supplies except gym shoes.

GRADE 2 - Two wide-line pencil tablets, one jar Elmer's Glue, pearl eraser, 1 box of crayons (16 colors), 12-inch ruler.

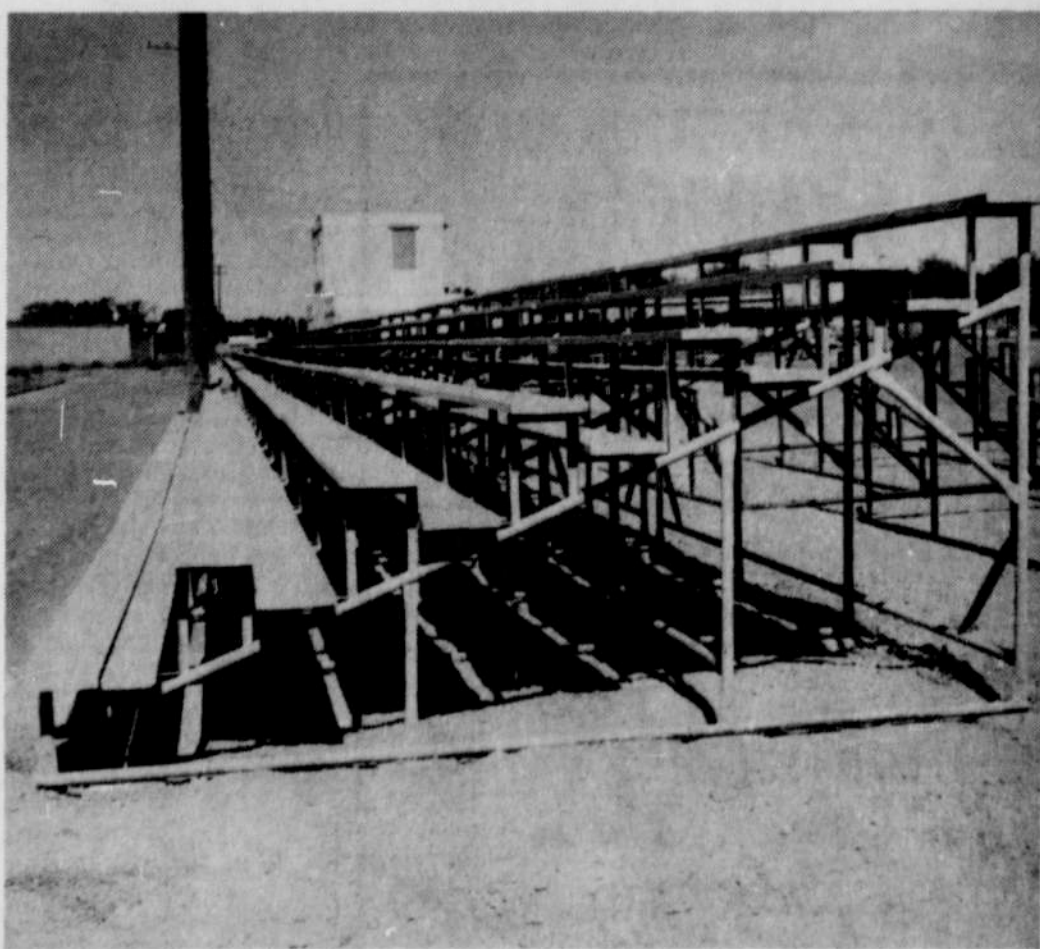
GRADE 3 - Two #2 pencils, pink pearl eraser, box of crayons (16 colors), 12-inch ruler, wide-line pencil tablet and a loose leaf notebook.

Supplies will be listed at time of registration by individual home room teachers for grades 4, 5, and 6, Monday, August 30. Each 4th, 5th, and 6th grade student should however, bring one #2 pencil and one loose leaf notebook.

Lunches will be served in the school cafeteria beginning on Tuesday, August 31. Charge for elementary pupils will be \$1.25, per child, for a 5-day week. Milk will be available. The milk ticket will cost \$1.00 and will allow the child to receive 33 pints of milk.

School insurance information and forms will be issued at registration. Insurance will be in effect at the time of receipt of \$2.50 and a signed registration form.

New Athletic Field Bleachers



This end shot shows the new bleachers in place and ready for the football season. They comprise 16 sections seven seats high stretching between the 5-yard lines. An additional 6 sections will be placed on the visitors side of the football field and moved to the baseball field in the spring.

These bleachers were constructed entirely by high school students under the NYC (Na-

tional Youth Corps) program with federal funds. They represent an approximate \$12,320 value for a cost of under \$4,000 to the school district.

Don Breshears, school custodian, supervised their construction and taught the students welding. The entire framework is of welded steel construction, with 12 inch planks for seats and footrests.
