

TVCC Starts Football Practice September 1

September 1 is the day that the seasons will come full circle for Treasure Valley Community College and Gary Farnsworth, Athletic Director, and head football coach for the Chukars. On that day prospects of all sizes and descriptions are scheduled to arrive for training. During the next four months they will be under the close supervision and tutelage of the proven Chukar coaching staff. Ultimately, how these young men fare in the season ahead, and, in some cases, in their careers depends much on the Chukar coaches, and, of course, most of all on Farney.



The 33 year old Farnsworth was born in Adrian. He attended school in Nampa where he graduated in 1956. He played quarterback for three years at Nampa High School and then lettered three years at the same position for University of Idaho. He has both BA and MS degrees from that institution.

He came to TVCC in 1966 as an assistant to Larry Stevens.

Prior to this he had coached two years at U of I under Skip Stahley, and four years at Borah High School where he acquired a 36-4 record. Going into his fifth year with the Chukars, Farney has a record of 26-10 included in

which is an unsullied 1967 season of 9-0.

A man can't coach for very long, associating with the aggressive striving type that is the athlete without a philosophy developing, a sort of wisdom about people distilled from the accretion of thousands of experiences with them, some exhilarating and some sad. Farney said this about the value of athletics and about the relationship between a coach and his players: "A coach doesn't develop or mold a man's attitude or personality; he gives him the opportunity to do that for himself. Sport is a constructive outlet for the aggressive individual. The aggressive young man doesn't get into trouble because he is an athlete, but rather because he is aggressive. Therefore, the coach and the sport give him an avenue for expression in a socially acceptable way."

On the importance of victory he said, "This is very important. The athlete must win to experience success, and success is what gives one pride and courage. No one can give the athlete pride and courage, but a coach can put him in a position to find them himself. Believe me, pride is more than a word-it is a commitment!"

Regarding his staff, Farney says, "Much of the success of our football program lies in the fact that we have been fortunate to attract men who have other responsibilities in the college; that is to say these men are talented coaches, but most important, they coach because they want to, because they enjoy it. Each coach has his area of direct responsibility; what success is found there is attributed to him. In the final analysis, however, it is the total effort that has made the Chukars what they are."

Game Commission To Establish Elk Range

The Oregon Game Commission took its first step toward the establishment of an elk winter range along the foothills of the Elkhorn Mountains by approving the purchase of the Sorenson property in the North Powder area of Baker County.

Action was taken following meetings with the Baker County Planning Commission, landowners, and the general public, with all parties concerned voicing approval of the project.

The Sorenson property encompasses just over 4,000 acres of second growth timber and brushy rangelands plus some acreage under cultivation. General location is in the Tucker Flat-Muddy Creek area south of the North Powder River.

Agricultural lands at the base of the Elkhorns have long been subject to elk damage with animals dropping down from the high mountain meadows to winter on the valley floor. There is no intermediate range on which the animals can winter as steep mountain slopes end abruptly in the agricultural lands below. During heavy snow

years damage becomes acute the full length of the valley from Baker on the south to the Shaw Mountain foothills near Ladd Canyon on the north.

The Commission feels that acquisition and development of the Elkhorn Management Area will alleviate undesirable damage problems in the immediate vicinity. An elk-proof fence is planned if it becomes necessary to prevent the animals from entering adjacent agricultural lands.

Extensive habitat improvement will be undertaken to provide additional forage in efforts to attract elk from adjacent lands. Artificial feeding may also become necessary to attract and hold animals on the management area.

The Commission plans to develop a viewing site for public use where citizens may enjoy seeing wintering elk herds, photographing the animals, and for the study of elk and other wildlife that may be present. When fully developed, the winter range is expected to attract mule deer and many other lesser animals in addition to elk.

Expert - A person who knows a great deal about some special thing. I have specifically studied pharmacy for over 40 years and hesitate to put myself up as an expert, yet I daily encounter drug experts who aren't even a member of the profession.

I read a lot and am knowledgeable on several subjects, but being knowledgeable certainly doesn't set me up as an expert. Let's take the stock market for example. I read the Wall Street Journal, Kiplinger's letter, several letters from brokerage firms and Standard and Poor's stock guide. I have read several books on the subject and have come to one (expert) conclusion, "There ain't a damned soul that really KNOWS much about what the market's going to do tomorrow or next year." In just about any issue of the Journal you can read divergent opinions from the experts, "The Market's going up, it's standing still, it's going to drop." Take your choice, in many instances I've found that my guess was as good or better than those who should know.

Your opportunity to deflate your dollar to two bits is greater than your chance to inflate a dollar to ten dollars. If you want to invest in a piece of America, do so but investigate thoroughly before hand. Hunches are not sufficient to place your money on. If you want the winner in horse races you look at the past performances of the horse, once in awhile you can pick a longshot and come out a big winner, but the long shots that lost probably cost you more than you won.

Remember that sometimes your broker is more interested in getting rid of something he's stuck with than in picking a winner for you. On the advice of one broker I sold Flying Tigers at \$20.00, it's now \$35.00 and bought Ray Resources at \$20.00 and they're now \$7.00. If you can't take time to become your own expert to become a millionaire, don't expect the broker to make you wealthy, some of them go broke.

The 8-acre ponds located just outside of Ontario were purchased from the Rogers Construction Company. The company had dug the pits to obtain gravel

for its numerous construction projects but the pits are now surplus to its needs. Located on land with a high water table, the excavations have filled from spring water and seepage to within a few feet of ground level.

They are expected to remain close to this level the year around.

The Commission plans to develop a trout fishery in the ponds if the fish grow well and can readily be taken by anglers.

If the trout fail to respond, the ponds will be stocked with panfish.

The angler access point is located on Lake Creek, tributary to the Siuslaw, near the community of Deadwood. The tract was purchased from Richard E. Baumgartner and will be developed by Lane County for boat launching. Lake Creek is a popular and productive steelhead stream but has limited boat access.
