## WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

PITCH OR TAR on beach clothes will come off if you give it a rush treatment.

Lay the garment, stained-side down, on several thicknesses of paper towel. Sponge back of stain thoroughly with dry cleaning fluid. Work from the center of the stain toward the outside edge, using light brushing or tamping motions. If the stain does not disappear, repeat this process using turpentine.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE between a "reconditioned" and a "rebuild" vacuum cleaner? These words are often used by dealers selling second hand equipment.

Usually, reconditioned vacuums have had little more than a general clean-up. Maybe necessary parts needed for immediate operation have been replaced.

Rebuild indicates a more thorough overhaul. However, dealer reliability will determine how correct these definitions are.

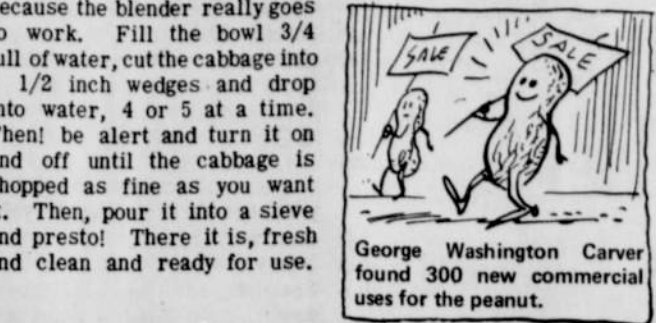

Oh! perhaps the children make milkshakes with them, perhaps Pop beats up an egg nog or Mom mixes scrambled eggs but there are many more uses. If I only used it for chopping vegetables I'd feel it was worth the price of the appliance. I hate to chop anything! Be sure you chop it only slightly because the blender really goes to work. Fill the bowl 3/4 full of water, cut the cabbage into 1 1/2 inch wedges and drop into water, 4 or 5 at a time. Then! be alert and turn it on and off until the cabbage is chopped as fine as you want it. Then, pour it into a sieve and presto! There it is, fresh and clean and ready for use.
