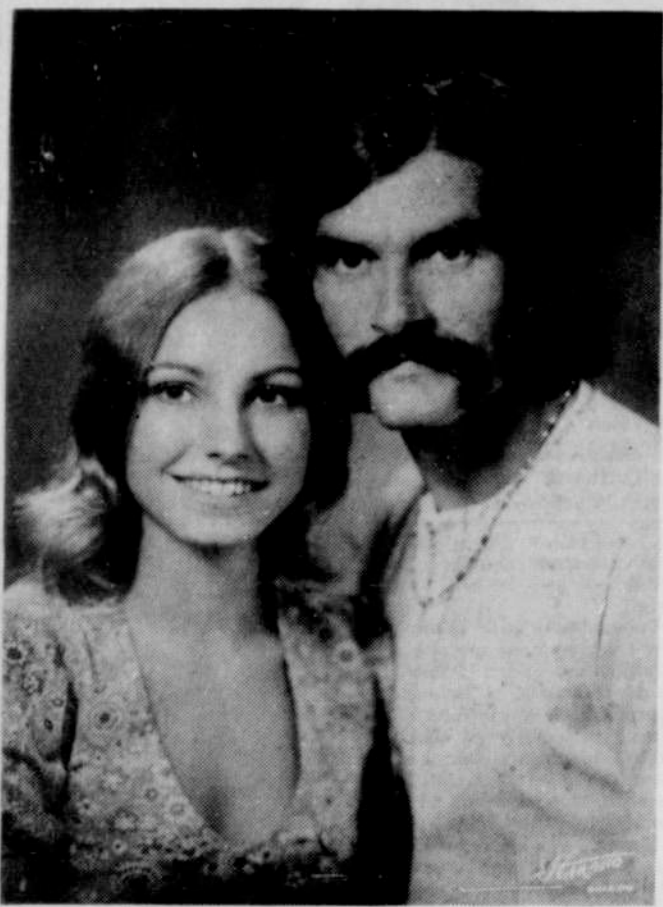


Hues of Lavender Set Scene For McGinley-Oliver Reception
