Round-up Parade Set For September 11

The official opening of the 1971 Pendleton Round-Up season will be at 7:00 p.m., Saturday, September 11, when the colorful Round-Up Dress-Up parade will be staged in downtown Pendleton. The Round-Up and Happy Canyon dates are September 15-18, with early roping go-arounds expected to begin September 14. This year's Round-Up purse of \$13,625 will be added to the entry fees of contestants and may possibly top last year's purse of \$33,958.

Good seats remain for the opening day, Wednesday, September 15, with the family package plan open until Saturday, September 11. The Round-Up family plan is a package entertainment for any couple and their children, which includes reserved seats to the afternoon Round-Up, tickets to the beef barbecue and reserved seats at the Happy Canyon night pageant. Served at the barbecue are range-style baked beans, barbecued beef, coleslaw and beverage. During the barbecue, free pony rides will be provided for the youngsters in the Round-Up arena. The family plan is the best bargain of the Round-Up, according to Round-Up President Bob Hales, Adams.

Queen Patti Healy and her court, Princesses Teri Thompson, Adams, Brenda Ricco, Prairie City, Judy Purchase, Pendleton and Jeri Krebs, Cecil, will reign over the 1971 Round-Up. Happy Canyon Princess is Judy Moses, Pendleton. The Queen and her princesses open each day of the Round-Up with a grand entry, when each of them rides into the arena from various points, races across the arena and jumps her horse over the railing in front of the South Grandstand. The Queen enters from the center gate at the north side of the arena to lead the court in a race around the quarter-mile track of the Round-Up.

The first event is the bareback bronc riding, where the horse is released from the bucking chutes and the rider is given an eight-second ride. The bareback bronc riding is one of six Rodeo Cowboy's Association approved events. The others

are saddle bronc riding, brahma bull riding, steer roping, steer wrestling and calf roping. Other competitive events include a wild cow milking contest, a stage coach race, Indian relay race, Pony Express and baton relay races and a free-for-all square dance. The Indian tribal dancing is held in the arena and winners of the dance are named each day.

There is entertainment for all of the family at the Pendleton Round-Up, which opens at 1:15 p.m., Wednesday, September 15 in the Round-Up stadium. The four-day show ends with the Saturday finals and the naming of the All - Around champion cowboy.

JAIL SENTENCE FOR DRUNK DRIVING

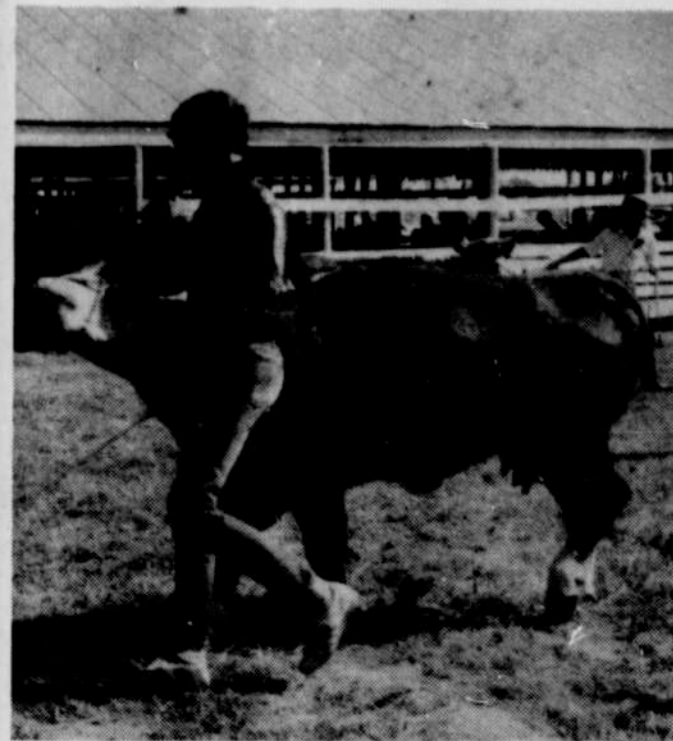
If you are convicted of driving under the influence of alcohol and the blood alcohol reading is 0.15 or more, you will find yourself spending time in jail under a new Oregon law scheduled to take effect September 9.

The new law makes a distinction in the penalty for drivers who are convicted of driving while under the influence at levels of 0.15 percent or more by weight of alcohol in his blood, the penalty, upon conviction, is "imprisonment in the county or municipal jail for not less than six days and not more than one year, or a fine of not more than \$2,000, or both."

A convicted driver also will continue to face a mandatory license suspension of 90 days for the first conviction, one year for a second conviction within 10 years, and three years for a third or subsequent conviction within 10 years.

The agency says that the new law reflects the seriousness of driving after excessive drinking. In 1970, it said, 36 percent of the drivers killed in Oregon traffic who were tested for blood alcohol content had readings of .15 or more.

Medical authorities say all drivers, regardless of their drinking habits, are impaired when blood alcohol levels reach .10.

Work Smarter - Not Harder

KEEP YOUR COOL IN THE kitchen. A hot humid kitchen contributes to fatigue.

Consider a forced exhaust system to remove moist warm air from the range, sink and dishwasher, and to carry out cooking odors, smoke and grease particles. The fan should be able to change the air in the kitchen every three minutes. Ductless hood fans clean circulated air and remove odors. They do not remove heat or moisture.

"BY THE YARD, life is hard, by the inch, it's a cinch." Many young homemakers in our Extension programs think this is a good motto for them.

When you have many different things to do, a lot of time can be lost worrying and wondering where to start. Take one or two jobs at a time--and finish them. Then you'll feel you've accomplished something.

TO PREVENT SEWING thread from getting caught in the notch of the spool on the sewing machine, place the spool so that the notch is not in the way of the unwinding thread.

On an upright spindle, place the spool with notch at the top; when the spindle is below, place the notch down; when the spindle is horizontal, place the notch toward the fly wheel.

USE SHATTER-RESISTANT bulbs for outdoor lights. They have a rubber-like coating that provides resistance to breakage. The tough coating prevents flying glass chips if the bulb is accidentally broken.

Ullman Urges Action On Longshoreman Strike

If President Nixon and Labor Secretary James Hodgson are not successful in persuading striking West Coast longshoremen to return to work, Congressman Al Ullman said legal action to end the strike is becoming "a definite possibility."

Ullman said a good case could be made that the strike is illegal because it centers primarily on union jurisdiction disputes rather than wages and labor-management disagreements.

Harry Bridges, president of the 60,000-member International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, said Wednesday that his union would continue its seven-week-old strike despite President Nixon's plea that strikers return to work.

Ullman said the President's wage and price freeze mandated an early end to the strike. "The central issue is getting people back to work before Oregon's economy, already shaken by the rail strike, is further damaged," he said. The congressman said understood negotiations between the union and the Pacific Maritime Association might be resumed sometime next week.

More than \$28 million has been lost in the lumber industry alone since the strike began July 1, Ullman said.

"A meeting of wheat growers, elevator operators and longshoremen Tuesday has also produced no tangible results. Now Oregon is sitting with a bumper wheat crop which will rot because storage facilities are already overburdened," he asserted.

Japanese Embassy official Yoshio Okawara said in Portland last week that if the longshore strike continues too long, Japan will have to look to Canada and Australia for its wheat.

Ullman said he would also urge Union and Southern Pacific Railroads to start gearing up for shipments to the coast. The railroads have said much of their rolling stock has been assigned to other areas because of the longshore strike. "The pickup of rail service after the rail strike has been spotty in some areas," Ullman said. "Faced with the usual freight car problem at this time of year, if the railroads don't

prepare now it will be several weeks and maybe months before some products are shipped to the coast if the longshore strike ends quickly."

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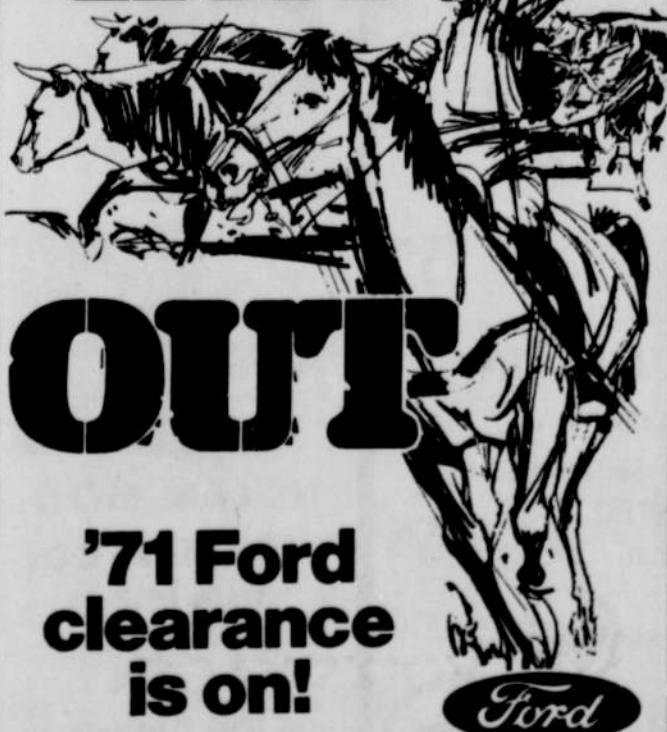


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
