Crews will immediately begin work on the Owyhee Reservoir roadbed and right-of-way to prepare it for oiling next summer, according to Paul House who will serve as engineer on the project.

House said it would be necessary to close this road to traffic while part of this work is being done. During these times the old road from the northwest corner of Mitchell Butte will be used. It will be graded and made passable for passenger cars.

The road project will be approximately 17 miles in length, extending from the Owyhee River siphon to the state park, about three miles above the dam.

The county, North Board of Control and Nyssa Road District will all help by furnishing equipment and personnel to supplement the \$70,000 appropriation from the state.

Each person should settle this question for himself: Do I possess Christ? Does Christ possess me?

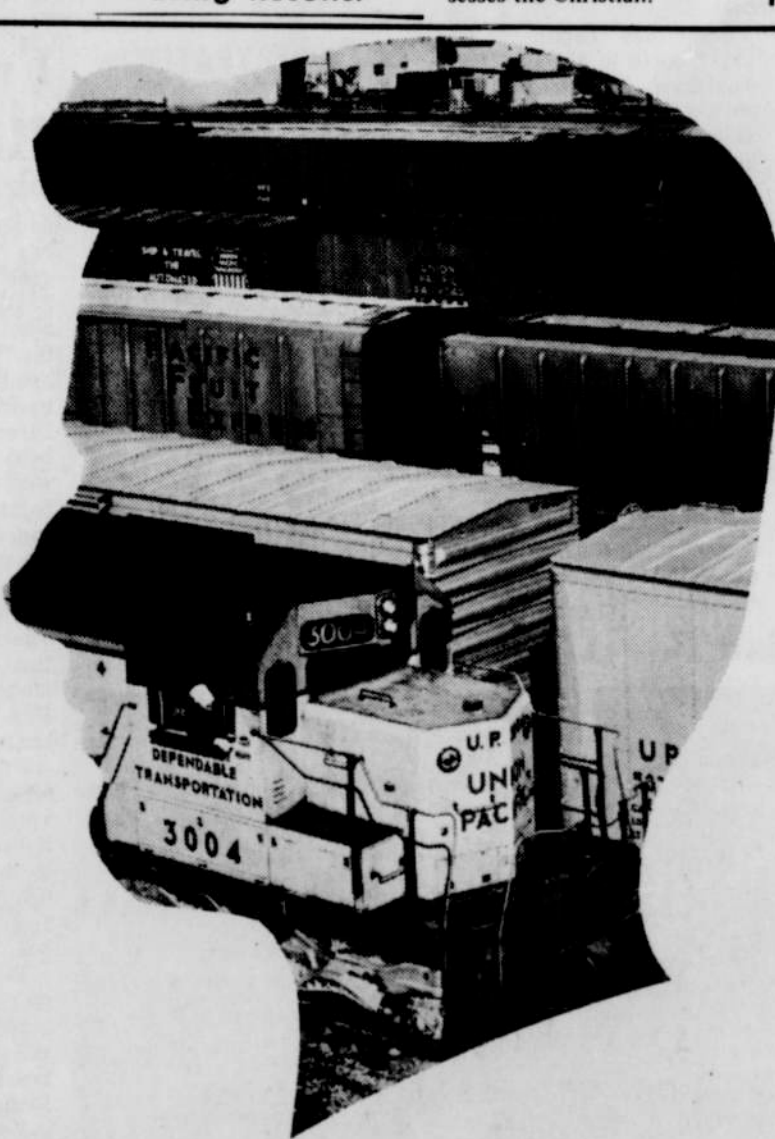
