TVCC To Offer Oil Painting This Fall



Treasure Valley Community College will offer this fall to the residents of Nyssa a ten week session in oil painting. The course, to be taught by Roger Baker who has conducted similar classes in Adrian and Vale, is tentatively scheduled to be held at the Nyssa Public Library Meeting room. An organizational meeting will be held Wednesday evening, September 29, at the library from 7 p.m. until all questions are answered and those who wish registered. Everyone who might be interested is in-

vited to attend this first meeting. Transferable college credit (2) is available to those who wish it. Cost to the student will be \$15 plus materials (around \$10 for first time people) except for senior citizens who may register at the reduced rate and for out-of-state residents who pay more. The course will be taught on an individual basis so that beginners as well as those with experience will find the class suited to their particular needs.
