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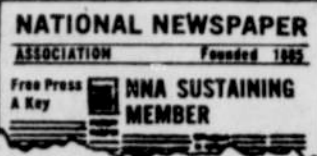
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Jobs For Veterans Month

October has been designated Jobs for Veterans month by Governor Tom McCall to point out the vexing problem of unemployment among veterans this year as veterans return to Oregon at the rate of about 700 a month.

During October, as Veterans Day falls on the 25th, and because of the need to find training and job opportunities for the 14,000 Oregon veterans now estimated to be looking for suitable work, a strategic campaign has been launched. The campaign is spearheaded by the Governor's Task Force on Jobs for Veterans, in cooperation with the Mayor's Task Force in Portland, and other local, state, private and federal organizations. Employers are being urged to look around their places of business and choose veterans for their job and training opportunities.

Governor McCall has pointed out that "to use this well-spring of expertise and knowhow will bolster the economy and bring stability to the Oregon work force."

Senator Henry Jackson

Regardless of party affiliation, Senator Henry Jackson (D-Wash.) bears watching as a candidate for national leadership. He has long been saying many things that need to be said regarding the survival of our country in a nuclear age.

Early in 1969, for example, he told the Associated General Contractors of America that the price of greatness is responsibility, and that we have to live up to our role as the free world's leader if the free world is to survive.

The truth speaks loudly, he said, and Moscow's drive to parity with us in its missile forces is very disturbing. Krushchev was removed from power, he pointed out "for having to back down."

In that speech, and many times since, he has made the following points: 1) The Soviet Union is not ready to live in peace; 2) The USSR is not becoming more liberal; 3) The United States is not primarily responsible for the arms buildup; 4) You cannot have successful negotiations with the USSR merely by sitting down and talking.

Senator Jackson is also worth watching because he has tremendous ability as a campaigner, with a higher percentage of re-election votes than anyone else in the Senate. At 58, he has spent more than half of his life in Congress.

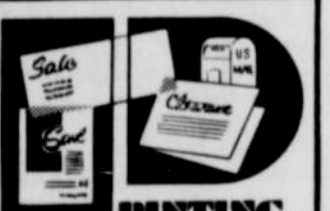
LETTER TO EDITOR

10 YEARS AGO

30 YEARS AGO
