2 large bananas, diced  
1 pkg. dream whip  
1 can lemon pie filling  
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add 7-Up, pineapple, marshmallows and bananas. Pour into 9x13 dish and refrigerate until partially set. Whip dream whip according to directions, fold lemon pie filling into this and spread over fruit mixture. Serves 10 - 12.

## Temperatures Important In Potato Harvest

Fall is here and soil temperatures are falling and will continue to fall. Growers in this Treasure Valley area must be aware and must adjust their farming operations as the soil temperature lowers states Warren Henninger, Malheur County Potato and Onion Extension Agent.

He advises potato growers to use the 45 degree guideline in planning potato harvests. The key to potato harvest bruise reduction lies in the four inch soil temperature which should not be much below 45 degrees when harvest begins. Henninger advises growers to mount accurate thermometers on pickups, trucks and harvest equipment to remain constantly advised of the temperature changes. A pulp device to check the four inch soil temperature would also be most useful.

Fall soil fumigation has started here in the Treasure Valley, said Henninger. Soil temperature also plays an important role in the success of this farming operation. Soil temperature at about the eight inch level, or application depth, should be between 55 - 70 degrees F. Henninger said at temperatures below 45 degrees F the fumigant only partially forms a gas and as a result does not disperse and do the job it was intended to do. At temperatures above 80 degrees F the fumigant forms a gas and evaporates to qualify, resulting in little kill.

## Council Plans Move

President, Don Johnston, Bakersfield, Calif., of the National Potato Council announced today that the Council will be moving to Denver, Colo., within the very near future. The announcement was made from Presque Isle, Maine, following a meeting of the Steering Committee.

The Council has maintained its headquarters in Washington, D.C., for the past twenty-three years. The move represents a major change in the organization. The Council will continue to watch closely all legislative and departmental activities that would affect potatoes, but there is a need for additional liaison work between the states and areas due to many new problems. Some of the more urgent needs will include closer coordination and the dissemination of reliable information. This new effort will include but not be limited to the fields of marketing, collective bargaining and farm labor. The effective interchange of critical information is a necessity if each area hopes to perform in the best interest of their local growers.

It has been determined by the Steering Committee that these and other problems could be handled more efficiently and effectively from a more central location and at the same time the present duties of the organization could be adequately fulfilled. A recent poll of the Board of Directors indicated they were in agreement with the move.

The new office headquarters will be located in Suite 301, Montbello Office Campus, 45th and Peoria, Denver, Colorado, 80239. Montbello is a "city within a city" located adjacent to Stapleton Field, the Denver Airport. It is a complete complex including an industrial and warehouse area; a commercial office development; a complete shopping center; and a residential area which will eventually contain 40,000 people, all within the city limits of Denver.

## NHS Revises Curriculum In English Department

With four weeks of school behind them, Nyssa High School students are experiencing and, from comments overheard in the halls, are enjoying the new curriculum within the English Department.

Last winter and spring the members of the English Department together with Principal Gene Chester held conferences to determine how the English Department offerings might better meet the student's needs. The results of such a study are being used this academic year.

Incoming freshmen follow a traditional full-year program which includes an introduction to writing and literature.

At the sophomore level, all students are required to enroll for one semester of Oral Communication and one semester of Written Communication. A description of each course follows.

**ORAL COMMUNICATION:** The emphasis will be on content, organization, performance, audience motivation, language, discussion and parliamentary procedure. Also, special attention shall be given to voice and diction, bodily action, reading from the printed page, and style in the preparation and presentation of speeches. Emphasis will be on informal discussion; one to one conversation; oral interviews for job applications; group communication; the ability to communicate thought and feeling; and the improvement of powers of appreciation and evaluation in talking, viewing, and listening. Quite a few of the speeches will be impromptu and/or extempore. There will be no competition with other schools.

**WRITTEN COMMUNICATION:** Various writing situations will be presented to improve the student's ability to write clear concise sentences, paragraphs, and themes; to choose topics; and to create imaginatively. The writing of news stories, letters, job applications, and invitation will also be included.

Concurrent with the required courses at the sophomore level, a series of one semester courses may be elected. At present there are few courses that are strictly junior or senior level courses. Every junior and senior must enroll in an elective English course each semester.

The courses, which will vary from year to year, available for the current 1971-72 year are:

**THE SHORT STORY:** This course will include a collection of short stories which can be read, understood, and enjoyed by young adults and will appeal especially to high school students. They will cover suspense, humor, character, fantasy, and other themes. Among authors to be read will be Ernest Hemingway, H.G. Wells, William Faulkner, Robert Louis Stevenson, O. Henry, and John Steinbeck. Supplementary reading and writing will be included in this course.

**VOCABULARY BUILDING AND WORD USAGE:**

This course is designed to improve the student's vocabulary through the study of morphology (word formation) and word functions. The course will include the following:

- (1) Dictionary study of diacritical markings
- (2) Dictionary study of prefixes and suffixes
- (3) Dictionary study of word meanings and various spellings
- (4) Word analysis and study from periodicals (newspapers and magazines)
- (5) Word identification from listening and reading
- (6) Vocabulary improvement through usage of vocabulary learned in class

### MASS MEDIA:

This elective course will develop for the student a systematic study of functions of popular media: newspaper, magazine, advertising, propaganda, the fine arts (music and art), television, and the film. Resource people with lectures, field trips, research, and writing will be included in the course.

**FANTASY AND FOLKLORE:** Reading matter will be literature which explores the world of make-believe and implications of what could be existent or present but in fact is not.

**AMERICAN CULTURE FROM THE CIVIL WAR TO THE PRESENT:**

This course will be a chronological study of main currents of thought in art, music, and literature of the United States. The areas of study to be included in this course are: Continuation of the Westward Movement, Realism and Materialism, and America and the Modern World. Studies in drama, the short story, poems, and essays of the United States will be included. Among the major figures included in this study will be Willa Cather, Walt Whitman, Bret Harte, Mark Twain, and artists and composers. Supplementary reading and writing will be included.

**WESTERN AMERICAN LITERATURE:**

Western American Literature will be a course designed to acquaint the student with literary features of Western America--that area west of the Mississippi--in conjunction with the history of its settlement and exploration. A study will be made of pioneer literary accomplishments, Indian folklore, and geographical areas. Some of the following authors will be studied: A.B. Guthrie, Walter LaFarge, Mark Twain, Tom Lea, Stephen Crane, Bret Harte, John Steinbeck. Supplementary reading and writing will be included in this course.

**CREATIVE WRITING:**

This course will provide opportunity and encouragement for those who wish to express themselves through literary mediums. Models of essays, short stories, and poetry will be studied and original work will be written in each of these branches of writing. Supplementary reading and writing will be included in this course.

**SHAKESPEARE:** This class will study representative comedies, histories, and tragedies, with attention to Shakespeare's development as a dramatist and as a representative of Renaissance thought.

**COLLEGE PREPARATORY COMPOSITION:**

The course will develop advanced writing skills beyond the level attained at the termination of Written Communication. Designed for those seniors who anticipate a college experience, the class members will also learn how to choose, limit, organize, and develop themes for critical writing. An investigative, library research paper will be included.

**BUSINESS - VOCATIONAL ENGLISH:**

This course is designed to aid those who will be going to special vocational schools or who will be taking on-the-job training. Letters of application, order forms, reading graphs and charts, applying for a job, personal habits and character traits, interviews, and business language will be some of the topics covered in the activities for this course. Pre-requisite: one semester of typing.

**SPEECH COMPETITION:**

Preferably the student desiring this class will enroll for a full year because competition transcends both semesters. The students will be involved in both forensic and dramatic activities which include panel discussion, poetry reading, extempore, impromptu, after dinner, expository speech, salesmanship, original oratory, memorized oratory, serious and humorous interpretation, radio speaking, one-act play, and choral speaking. Some work on retold story and original essays will be included.

Applications for United States Army four-year nursing scholarships are now being accepted. Sgt. John Mathews, local Army recruiter announced here this week.

High school seniors or recent graduates under the age of 23 having high scholastic standings should apply immediately as all applications requirements must be completed before January 15 instead of March 1 as in previous years.

Known as the Walter Reed Army Institute of Nursing (WRAIN) program, these scholarships provide the opportunity for young men and women, interested in nursing careers, to receive nearly all expenses paid for four years toward a bachelor of science degree in nursing. The Idaho-Oregon Promotion Committee desires to use the largest onions grown in this area for promotional purposes to advertise that this area grows the largest onions in the world. Four prizes will be awarded. First prize is set at \$60, said Henninger.

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
