Grain Exports

Still At Zero

That spot for tallying grain exports from the Ports of Portland and Astoria on the Oregon Department of Agriculture's grain inspection report still has only a large "goose egg" for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1971.

Last year by the end of September department grain inspectors had checked a total of 626,062 tons of grain export from those two ports.

The impact of the west coast dock strike was also showing up in the reduced volume of incoming grain at the two ports, since portside elevators are not being cleared by exports.

By the end of September this year 182,370 tons of incoming grain had been checked at the Ports of Portland and Astoria, 138,531 tons of which were inspected in September. During that three-month period a year ago inspections covered a total of 766,087 tons of grain and for the month of September a year ago incoming grain totaled 218,551 tons.

Movement of incoming grain at Pendleton was also down from a year ago, with only 7,320 tons of grain covered by inspections during the first three months of the fiscal year. In the same period a year ago inspections covered 33,050 tons.

Protein analyses made by the Grain Division laboratory during the first three months of the fiscal year starting in July, 1971, dropped to 4,936. In the same period last year 13,760 analyses were made. The number of certificates issued for that same three-month period this year stood at 19,112 compared with 46,905 for the same months a year ago.

EOC PLACES MOST 1971 GRADUATES

Of the 176 Eastern Oregon College graduates last year who showed interest in teaching by registering with the placement office, 73 per cent were placed in elementary education, and 50 per cent in secondary.

These figures from a recent report by C.E. Zahl, director of placement, increase to 91 per cent for elementary and 60 per cent for secondary, when those unavailable for placement are deducted.

"We feel that our overall success in placing both elementary and secondary teachers furnishes a pleasant contrast to some information about the general situation," Zahl said.

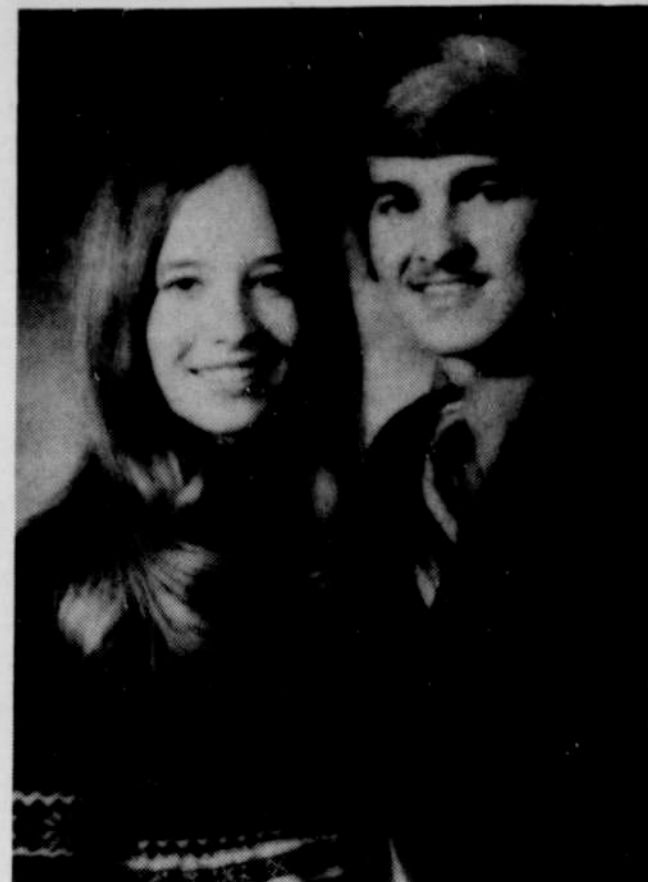
Of the 78 students who registered for elementary school posts, 57 have confirmed positions; two took other employment; three withdrew availability for hiring, and 14 would accept posts only in certain localities.

For secondary graduates, 39 were placed; three took other positions; four entered the military, five withdrew, and 12 specified certain localities.

Only 20 general studies and liberal arts graduates registered with the placement office, and 67 per cent were placed, the report showed.

Between December, 1970, and August, 1971, 336 students received either bachelor's or master's degrees from EOC. Of these, the 176 registered with placement office.

Sen. Packwood Requests Release Of Rural Funds

Senator Bob Packwood (R-Ore.) has asked President Nixon to release \$195.5 million for the Rural Environmental Assistance Program.

An estimated \$2.5 million of the amount, which has been approved by Congress, would go to about 5,000 Oregon farmers. The maximum allowed any farmer is \$2,500.

REAP was formerly known as the Agricultural Conservation Program. It provides matching funds for farmers to finance programs to reduce soil erosion, improve wildlife conservation and implement new environmental practices.

"As of this date, Packwood said, 'no announcement of state allotments has been made. I feel that further delay of this program for fiscal 1972 will reduce the total effectiveness of the program which is so greatly

needed in rural America. For this reason, I urge the approval and the announcement of state allotments as soon as possible."

Packwood has introduced legislation, "The Agriculture Pollution Act of 1971," to allow REAP funds to be used for other cost-sharing purposes on the nation's small farms. For example, in Oregon where smudge pots are used to help heat fruit orchards, the Packwood proposal would allow REAP funds to be used for other cost-sharing purposes on the nation's small farms. The bill has 16 co-sponsors and is in the Senate Agriculture Committee.
