

Episcopal Church In Eastern Oregon To Become Diocese

The Most Rev. John E. Hines, Presiding Bishop of the 3,500,000 communicants of the Episcopal Church in this country and of its 17 missionary dioceses overseas, will visit Pendleton next month. He will be the official guest of the Episcopal Church in Eastern Oregon when it meets in its annual convocation at the Church of the Redeemer, Pendleton, November 19-20-21.

Besides 25 clergy and some 100 or more official lay delegates to the convocation it is expected there will be hundreds of Episcopal lay visitors in Pendleton for this very special occasion.

The primary purpose of Bishop Hines' visit is to officiate at the change-over of the Episcopal Church in Eastern Oregon from a missionary district to an independent diocese of the church. The General Convention (of the Episcopal Church) which met in Houston, Tex., in October 1970, made provision for all missionary districts in this country (still 7 of them, mostly in the west) to become dioceses.

A diocese is a jurisdiction of a number of Episcopal parishes and missions under its own bishop, with a certain independent status, and usually self-supporting.

A missionary district was a form of church "colonialism" in the early days of the Episcopal Church under a missionary bishop sent out by the whole church.

In its independent status a diocese has the right of electing its own bishop, the right of being represented in General Convention by four clergy and four laity, rather than only one clergyman and one layman, as a missionary district. It also has the right of holding its property thru a board of trustees made up of laity and clergy, rather than under the bishop as corporation sole.

Packwood Asks Intervention On School Lunch Program

Concerned that 30,000 Oregon needy school children may have to go without school lunches, Senator Bob Packwood (R-Ore.) has asked the President to intervene to prevent what appears to be an "unlawful interpretation" of the National School Lunch Act.

Under strong pressure from both Houses of Congress, the Department of Agriculture last week increased reimbursement rates for school lunches from 35 cents to 45 cents. However, the effectiveness of that move was diluted by Agriculture's follow-up decision to impose a new upper limit on eligibility for the program at \$3,940 for a family of four.

The proposed regulation would draw a mandatory cut-off of aid at the \$3,940 income level. As a result, 30,000 Oregon school children would have to pay the full price for school lunches or go without.

In a letter to the President, Packwood and 58 other Senators, charged that the Department of Agriculture had interpreted the \$3,940 national poverty line for participation in the school lunch program as a "ceiling" rather than a "floor."

"Essentially, the National School Lunch Act established the poverty line as a minimum eligibility standard and allowed state and local school districts

to make the final determination of eligibility," Packwood said. "But the Department of Agriculture has arbitrarily interpreted the law as a ceiling, and this clearly violates both the letter and the spirit of the National School Lunch Act," he said.

Under the Agriculture interpretation of the law, Oregon's present eligibility level of \$4,000 for free lunches and \$4,940 for reduced-price lunches would be disregarded.

"The Government can't afford to literally take the food out of the 'mouths of babes' to cut spending. It seems to me we would be enforcing poverty among families of the working poor," he said.

Sen. Hatfield To Introduce Wilderness Act Bill

Senator Mark O. Hatfield said in Bend Thursday, October 21 that he will introduce an "Oregon Omnibus Wilderness Act" which would designate as wilderness more than approximately 200,000 acres of national forest in Oregon.

He said that as presently drafted his bill includes additions to the Three Sisters and Mt. Jefferson Wilderness areas and it would create a new wilderness area in the Mt. Hood National Forest.

Decision as to inclusion of additional areas in the bill will be made after evaluation of data from the U.S. Forest Service, he said.

Speaking before a community dinner sponsored by the Bend Chamber of Commerce, Hatfield said that "only 1.2% of Oregon now is classified as wilderness."

"This is an extremely low figure for a state with this much beautiful forest land," he said.

Hatfield pointed out that Oregon has a smaller percentage of wilderness than any other western state with the exception of Nevada.

Washington, he said, has some

2.5% in wilderness area.

He said that another piece of legislation he is sponsoring, the American Forestry Act, "would bring small private tracts of land into the supply picture and improve forest management on our federal forests."

"While I believe that we should set aside more wilderness area, it is clear that we must also continue to provide more wood for housing," Hatfield said.

"By providing higher levels of funding for reforestation and management of these forests, we can save more in their natural state for future generations," Hatfield said.

Ullman Seeks Repeal Of Ammunition Bill

A bill sponsored by Congressman Al Ullman to repeal federal registration requirements on .22 caliber rimfire ammunition was approved by the Ways and Means Committee this week, it was announced Friday.

A similar bill by Ullman passed the House last year but died in the Senate's year-end legislative log-jam.

The bill has not yet been scheduled for debate in the house but Ullman said he thought it would be brought up within the month.

"The most popular sporting ammunition used in the country is .22 rimfire," Ullman said. "About 4.3 billion rounds are sold by over 150,000 dealers every year." For this reason, Ullman said, it is impossible to trace the ammunition from manufacture or sale to actual use.

The Justice Department has said that the voluminous records of .22 caliber ammunition sales are virtually worthless from a law enforcement viewpoint, Ullman noted.

"This is the first important step toward ending this unnecessary and onerous requirement," Ullman said.

He said the law has only served to hinder and harass law-abiding citizens who enjoy hunting and other outdoor sports.

In a letter recommending enactment of Ullman's bill, Deputy Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst said his department has not received a single case from the Treasury Department for prosecution from ammunition records.

PSU PRESIDENT MEETS WITH TVCC

Gregory B. Wolfe, President of Portland State University and Portland State University faculty member, Frank Roberts met Thursday with TVCC President Skinner, Joaquin Hernandez, and members of the TVCC administration. The purpose of the visit, according to President Wolfe, was to discuss the operation of programs for minorities, particularly programs leading to university admission.

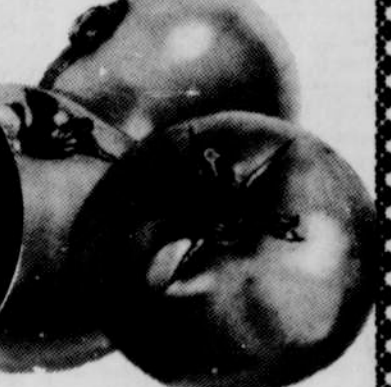
