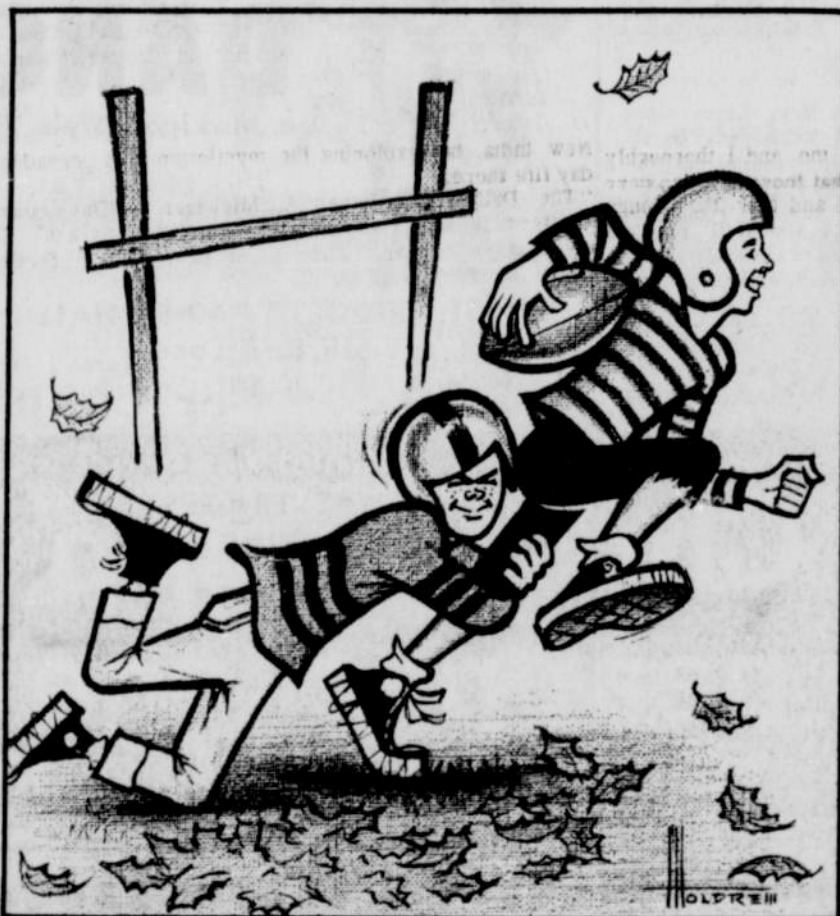
ACTIVITIES
