Kidney Association of Oregon
Launches State Wide Fund Drive

The Kidney Association of Oregon today launched its third annual statewide fund drive with a goal set at \$200,000. The money will be used during 1972 to help provide kidney failure victims now on home artificial kidney machine treatment throughout Oregon with necessary equipment and supplies they cannot afford. Funds also will be used, KAO officials say, to add as many new patients as possible during 1972.

The Malheur County Kidney Association of Oregon patient is Richard Babcock of Ontario. KAO president, Portland attorney, Charles V. Elliott said, "We were successful in exceeding our funds drive goal of \$150,000 for 1970-71 by \$8,000. We also continued to be successful," he reported, "in keeping many kidney failure victims alive and rehabilitating them with the help of the Oregon Division of Vocational Rehabilitation."

"We have been steadily accepting new patients," Elliott said, "and as a result, our responsibility for raising funds through public contributions to help care for these Oregonians has increased."

Most people faced with death because of kidney failure, he pointed out, cannot afford the high cost of kidney machine training and follow-up treatment on a home kidney machine. The function, therefore, of the

Kidney Association of Oregon, he said, is to raise funds in order that patients may continue treatment, which will allow them to work, raise families and be useful people.

The cost of training, equipment and home supplies for the first six months for a new KAO patient is about \$10,000. After this period, the cost per year to maintain a patient on an artificial kidney machine in his home is approximately \$4,000.

"One of the keys to success of our 1970-71 drive," Elliott explained, "was the figure \$12,000." Thousands of Oregonians, he said, heeded KAO's plea to help provide another day of life for KAO patients, which costs \$12,000. Many people, he added, gave much more than one day of life.

Retroactive Pay Expected
For Oregon Teachers

Nearly all Oregon public school teachers should receive retroactive pay boosts in spite of the Presidential Wage-Freeze Order, Cecil W. Posey, executive secretary of the Oregon Education Association, said Wednesday.

During a background briefing by the new federal pay board, an informed source noted that "taxes are prices" in explaining that teachers might receive retroactive pay under the board's policy that such increases will be allowed where employers raised prices before the freeze in anticipation of wage increases.

Posey noted that almost all Oregon school boards approved budgets prior to July 1, 1971, based on increases in teacher pay and that taxes were authorized to fund those budgets prior to the imposition of the wage-price freeze.

"It seems clear," Posey contended, "that school boards in Oregon have levied property taxes--increased their prices--in order to fund budgets that included new salary schedules for teachers and other employees."

"The new tax levies were on the rolls before August 14 and they reflected salary and fringe benefit agreements made last spring or even earlier," Posey explained.

"Under these circumstances, we expect that teachers in Oregon will not only be paid under the new salary schedules beginning next Monday, but also will be paid retroactively according to the new schedules for the two and a half months they already have worked this fall," Posey said.

Posey also noted that Donald Morrison, president of the National Education Association, has been appointed to the Advisory State and Local Govern-

ment Council to advise the Cost of Living Council during Phase II.

"President Morrison also is working to have a separate wage board appointed to consider matters concerning public employees," Posey revealed. "In addition, the NEA Legislative Division is pursuing the whole problem through the banking committees of the U.S. House and Senate."
