MARKET BASKET

APPLES are still the number one fruit although prices are slightly higher than they were. GRAPEFRUIT are coming from Texas, Florida and California in plentiful supplies. Quality is good for this early in the season. Good quality CRANBERRIES are plentiful. Bananas are frequently featured at bargain prices. New crop holiday NUTS are now in the markets.

Many vegetables are carrying higher price tags. The Oregon potato crop is a short one and prices are expected to be high. Freezing weather in southern growing areas has caused LETTUCE and TOMATO prices to increase considerably. Best vegetable buys are BROCCOLI, CABBAGE, CAULIFLOWER, TURNIPS, RUTABAGAS, SQUASH, CARROTS AND DRY ONIONS.

Fresh PORK, HAM and BACON continue to offer good values. There are plenty of good quality TURKEYS for the holidays. Broiler FRYER output has reached the record production levels of 1970 which means continued budget prices for consumers.

Large supplies of EGGS have been selling at prices below cost of production, however, egg prices are expected to increase considerably by December.

BEEF supplies for the rest of 1971 are expected to be higher. SALMON is now frozen. OYSTERS are excellent quality and plentiful. Moderate amounts of fresh SOLE, COD and SNAPPER are available.
