The grade was exceptionally high, and averaged about 98 percent No. 1. Growers received 20 cents per pound for No. 1 grade on delivery and are assured an additional dividend if turkeys sell at a higher figure. Higher price is virtually assured as all markets report a decided shortage for the Thanksgiving trade.

50 YEARS AGO

In response to the request of the President of the United States, the entire community, consisting of all churches, civic organizations, the Public Schools and citizens in general are invited and urged to attend and participate in Thanksgiving Services at the Methodist Church, Thursday, Nov. 24, at 11 a.m.

A community dinner will be served free. Bring your food and enough for some one else.

60 YEARS AGO

Regular meeting of the City Council was held at council rooms Saturday evening, there being present Mayor Boydell, councilmen Emison, Francis and Farmer, and S.D. Goshert, city recorder. Bills were allowed and work disposed of.

Ordered that cement crosswalks be constructed at First Street and Good Avenue, and City Recorder instructed to advertise for bids for said work.

The Nyssa Ferry heretofore purchased by the city was placed in the hands of the bridge commission, with instructions to issue free ferriage passes to all bona fide residents on the other side of the river, with certain restrictions governing the hauling, also confining the use of passes to day travel, except on Saturday nights, when passes may be used up to 10 o'clock.

Marshal W.W. Smith handed in his resignation, to take effect the latter part of the week, and it was reluctantly accepted by the council, all of whom averred he was the best officer the city ever had, but his resignation was made necessary by reason of his going into another line of work.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Editor, The Journal:

I am one reader who seems to agree so many times with the writer of one of your columns "Herb Sez". I, too, hate to hear people run-down and make unkind remarks about things of our community which I know and feel to be as good as what any other community has and perhaps a lot better.

I think so many of the people here in Nyssa overlook the fact that we have an outstanding hospital right here at our doorstep, built just for us, so that we don't have to go out of town for hospitalization.

Sometimes, for a particular kind of treatment, going out of town is necessary. After all, this small hospital can't be expected to have all the expensive equipment the larger ones do. But I'm speaking of the usual type of hospitalization the average patient needs.

Just recently, I had to spend a number of days at a hospital out of town. I got transferred to Nyssa as soon as they would allow me to be moved. I made no mistake coming home. Just as I thought, everything was better. Everything! Quieter; more prompt, personal care; friendlier nurses and hospital staff; daily consultations with the dietitian who fed me superbly on a low fat, no salt diet; it's close so visitors could stop by easily; and last but not least, it seemed like I knew half of the patients they continually admitted and released. They are all a part of me and my home town.

This being back among "my people" and the ones who cared had a lot to do with bringing me back to health. I can't praise the Malheur Memorial Hospital and their staff enough. I only wish more people realized how good it is and what a real asset to the community it is.

None of us like to be hospitalized, but I'm glad we have the best available when it's necessary.

Favorite Foods

Don't you love a Beef Roast, smothered in gravy and so tender you can cut it with a fork? These aren't all the assets of Beef Pot Roast in Foil. (I'm sure one of the new Brown-in-Bags would work too. I used this recipe "back in the olden days" when foil was new.

If your husband shot an old deer or elk and you wish to make him the proud "man of the house", cook it this way. BEEF POT ROAST IN FOIL 4-5 pound Beef Pot Roast 1 pkg. dehydrated onion soup mix 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) Cream of mushroom soup 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) Cream of celery soup

Dredge Beef Pot Roast in flour. Brown on both sides. Place on aluminum foil and cover with mixed soups and 1/2 cup water. Wrap securely in foil and bake one hour per pound at 300 degrees. This may be placed over a slow fire, turned occasionally, and cooked the same length of time. (The soups make a delicious gravy 8.

and flavor the roast.) Serves 8. Here's a goodie for Thanksgiving or in between. The ingredients incorporate traditional foods for November and December. It's attractive and easy to prepare. What more can you ask? (and last but by no means least, it stretches the food dollar.) HAM SWEET POTATO ROLL-UP 1/2 lb. ground beef 3/4 lb. ground ham 1/2 cup crushed cracker crumbs 1 egg 3/4 cup milk 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper 2 cups sweet potatoes mashed, seasoned 2 tbs. brown sugar 2 tbs. butter

Mix the first 7 ingredients and spread on waxed paper into a rectangle 1/2 inch thick. Spread sweet potatoes over the meat mixture. Sprinkle with brown sugar and dot with butter. Form into a roll and put into a 9x4x3 inch pan. Bake 1 hr. 15 min. at 350 degrees. Serves 8.
