### 10 YEARS AGO

Bob Q. Smith, Nyssa music instructor, is in receipt of a letter from Frederick Vogel, assistant director, performing arts division of Seattle World's Fair, stating that May 31, 1962 is date selected for Nyssa High School band to appear at Century 21 Exposition. The band also received an invitation to appear in the Sea Fair parade early in August at Seattle.

Smith has written Vogel to determine if a date of July 28 could be arranged for band members to appear at the World's Fair so they may appear in both events on the same trip.

Work projects, to raise funds for the trip, will begin soon after the first of the year in order that band members will be able to finance their own way.

### 20 YEARS AGO

Don M. Graham, gunner's mate, 1st class, arrived home Friday from San Diego, after a trip to Kobe, Japan. His ship, the USS Madrid, an attack troop transport, brought home 1647 combat marines.

Graham said "I took opportunity to spend my liberty as much as I could in the rural districts of Japan. In my dealings with the Japanese, which were considerable, I found them very respectful to the Americans and strictly honest. The census was that the Japanese people are better off in defeat than they would have been as a victorious nation. I noticed more than anything else, the change in the family life. The mother has assumed a position in the household that she never had before. Family life is more democratic, as is the govern-

ment. I not only respect the Japanese people, but I like them."

### 30 YEARS AGO

Plans for protection of public property in Malheur County against sabotage and other contingencies were outlined at a meeting of the county civilian defense council Monday.

Albert Heldt, commander of Nyssa post of the American Legion has called a special meeting of the Legion to give the Legion an opportunity to cooperate with the Defense Council.

Otis Smith of Ontario, county chairman, opened the luncheon meeting. "Hap" Logue, county coordinator, stated that no action has been taken to retain Japanese living in this County. Japanese have given assurance that they will cooperate with the defense council. There are 369 Japanese living in the area between Boise and Weiser on both sides of the Snake River. Of this number 70 live in Malheur County.

Louis P. Thomas of Nyssa, county vice-chairman, pointed out the need of unity in the defense efforts, and stressed the possibility of Malheur County having to take care of evacuees from coastal cities. Malheur County is a natural spot for such a program. He urged Americans, avoid war hysteria.

Frank Morgan of Nyssa said three guards placed at the Owyhee Dam to protect it against sabotage were not sufficient. As a result, council members passed a motion recommending that a company of United States Army be stationed at the Nyssa CCC Camp.

### 40 YEARS AGO

Now that it is winter and vacation time on the farm, Robert Cornett, first settler on the Owyhee irrigation project finds time to come to town and get acquainted. He reports that he has 70 acres seeded in rye from which he anticipates a fair yield next year. He is dry farming a season to get his land in good shape for water from the Owyhee reservoir in the spring of 1933.

Cornett is the first settler on the Owyhee. He built a small house on his 160 acre tract north of Owyhee School. A well has been drilled and other improvements made. About 80 acres is cleared and he will clear another 80 this spring. He may sell the second 80 as he finds that 160 acres is almost too much for one man.

### 50 YEARS AGO

After many years of hopeful and patient waiting, the settlers under the High-Line are now beginning to see a change for a brighter future. Everything seems to be pointing to the possibility of the early construction of the Owyhee project, which, if constructed, will lift a heavy weight from the heart of many an idle man, as well as those who own land in the district. If the work on the project is commenced at an early date, it will be not only a welcome stimulus to Nyssa, but the entire Snake River Valley will be benefited and room for thousands of new homes will be made possible for home seekers.

If approved and completed, the Owyhee project will supply water for approximately 150,000 acres of land, of which 100,000 acres are in Malheur County Oregon near Nyssa, and 50,000 near Homedale, Idaho.

### 60 YEARS AGO

Frank D. Hall and wife arrived in Nyssa in September and Mr. Hall took charge as cashier of the Bank of Nyssa. They have rented the Archie Sinclair bungalow on North First Street. Mr. Hall has been in the banking business at Silver City for several years, and is a gentleman of high standing in financial circles. His decision to invest his money here and become a citizen of Nyssa, after carefully studying conditions here, shows that he has every confidence in the future of this place.
