

FRESHMAN ORIENTATION, - REGISTRATION

A new summer freshman orientation-registration program will be initiated by the University of Oregon in July, 1972, University President Robert D. Clark announced.

The program will provide early academic advising and registration for high school graduates who plan to enter the University in the fall.

Six July dates have been scheduled for entering freshmen to come to the Eugene campus, to become acquainted with University facilities, housing options, and student action programs. They will also become acquainted with services that will be useful to them as they pursue their academic objectives.

A key part of each day's program will be the academic advising about curricular offerings. The entering freshman will have individual assistance from personnel of the several instructional departments in planning academic program for the first year.

Registration and payment of fees will follow the academic advising.

At the start of Fall Term, 1972, freshmen will be prepared to start classes without having to go through the registration process at that time.

The Division of Student Personnel Services will have the overall responsibility for coordinating the program series. Shirley J. Wilson, associate dean of students, will be coordinator.

Dean Burton J. Moyer of the College of Liberal Arts will plan and coordinate academic advising.

Parents are also invited to the orientation-registration sessions. While students are being advised and registered, visiting parents will be involved in informational meetings dealing with the goals, academic programs, facilities and services of the University. Opportunity will be provided for parents to talk with representative University personnel.

The summer program will have the advantage of allowing the University to deal separately with the special problems that students face as they enter the institution.

The advance enrollment information from the early registration will allow academic departments to make necessary adjustments in staffing and class patterns.

To facilitate entering freshmen and parents in planning for the new program, the University announces that the dates set for the orientation-registration sessions will be July 14, 17, 21, 24, 28, and 31.

Convenience Foods

The Food and Drug Administration is launching a major new consumer protection program affecting "convenience foods". What are convenience foods? They are those, Instant or Frozen- or Semi-Prepared- or "Heat-and-Serve" foods so many of us pick up in the market place.

How nutritious are convenience foods?

All have some nutritional value but many do not have enough. And that's where the FDA program comes in. To assure that they do contain appropriate nutritional qualities, FDA has proposed the first of a series of guidelines for this broad class of food. The guidelines cover pre-cooked, frozen, "heat-and-serve" dinners.

These guidelines—like the ones that are expected to follow for breakfast cereals, fruit drinks, and snack foods—were developed at FDA's request by an outstanding committee of the National Academy of Science. The guidelines will provide a basis for manufacturers to insure that the dinners contain enough but not too much of certain essential nutrients -- nutrients such as protein, vitamin A, vitamin B1, and vitamin B2.

The guidelines will be voluntary. Manufacturers will be encouraged to make products which comply with the guidelines. If they do—they then may use one of two proposed methods to identify their products. One would permit them to use a label carrying the following statement: "The nutrient content of this product meets the Federal Nutritional Guideline established for frozen convenience 'heat-and-serve' dinners..." This legend will be followed immediately by the number of calories the dinner contains.

Under the alternative proposal, those products not complying with the guidelines would be required to state on their labels that "The nutrient content of this product varies from the Federal Nutritional Quality Guidelines for — in that it —". The first blank would be filled in with the class of product and the second with a description of the manner in which the food does not comply with the guidelines.

Interested persons will have 60 days to submit comments, which should be filed with the Hearing Clerk, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

America Gets Boost From Sugarbeet Industry

Sugarbeet production is making a sizeable contribution toward stimulating jobs and income in rural America. Continued use of chemicals is vital to continued production of low cost food. Sugarbeet growers are faced with a possible cut in acreage allotments if they fail to meet their quotas under the Sugar Act.

These were important issues brought before some 400 growers and their guests at the 26th annual meeting of the National Sugarbeet Growers Federation in Salt Lake City.

Among the many speakers touching on these and other subjects were outgoing president, Robert Sakata of Brighton, Colo., Andrew Mair, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., Richard Blake, Federation Executive Vice President, Washington, D.C., and Robert Owen, President, Great Western Producers Cooperative, Denver, Colo.

Mair said there are more so-called family sized farms producing sugarbeets as part of general crop rotation than there are of most other crops. He said it is well to keep this in mind while considering the impact that \$400 million of gross income from sugarbeets can have on American agriculture. He added that most sugarbeet processing plants are located in rural areas where populations are declining and employment opportunities are limited.

"Critics of the sugar program should realize the program is supported by the interests of grower and processor," the USDA official said. "In October, legislation passed Congress extending the Sugar Act through 1974. Since receipts to the Treasury from sugar manufacturers are much larger than payments made by the government to sugar crop producers, anyone seriously interested in reducing the government deficit will not be likely to propose a limitation on Sugar Act payments."

Sakata, who handed over the Federation reins to Ishmael "Babe" Yost of Billings, Mont., and Blake strongly defended the necessity of chemical use in

production of the quantity and quality of foodstuffs needed to feed the nation and the world. They pointed out that there has been criticism of farmers for improper use of dangerous chemicals.

Sakata said, "The problem is maintaining a balance of nature while operating in the economic realm. If economics were not involved, we could easily go back to the old days before chemicals and see a resulting decline in production through the ravages of disease and insects."

"There is, of course, a responsibility on the part of farmers to make a responsible use of pesticides, if for no other reason than that their immediate health would be the first to be affected. We live with the stuff and don't want to commit suicide."

Blake added, "There are well meaning people who are preoccupied in concentrating on a narrow view of the environment and who are placing us in a difficult position."

"Production capacity of American farmers is up through the use of certain chemical pesticides, and if Americans expect increased production to continue, with resulting low food prices, they must also expect the continued proper use of pesticides."

Oregon To Participate In 1972 4-H Program

Oregon is one of eight states chosen to participate in the 1972 4-H Citizenship in Action program, reports H. Joe Myers, assistant director for 4-H and youth, Oregon State University Cooperative Extension Service.

The program, sponsored by the Reader's Digest Foundation, provides small grants to assist 4-H members in planning and conducting citizenship activities in their own communities, Myers explains.

Each year, eight states are chosen to participate in the

program administered by the National 4-H Foundation. Others selected for 1972 include Arizona, Kansas, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Montana and Washington.

Grants ranging from \$50 to \$500 are available to 4-H groups. Forms and information are available from county extension offices and projects must receive local approval before they are submitted to the state 4-H office by mid-January, Myers notes.

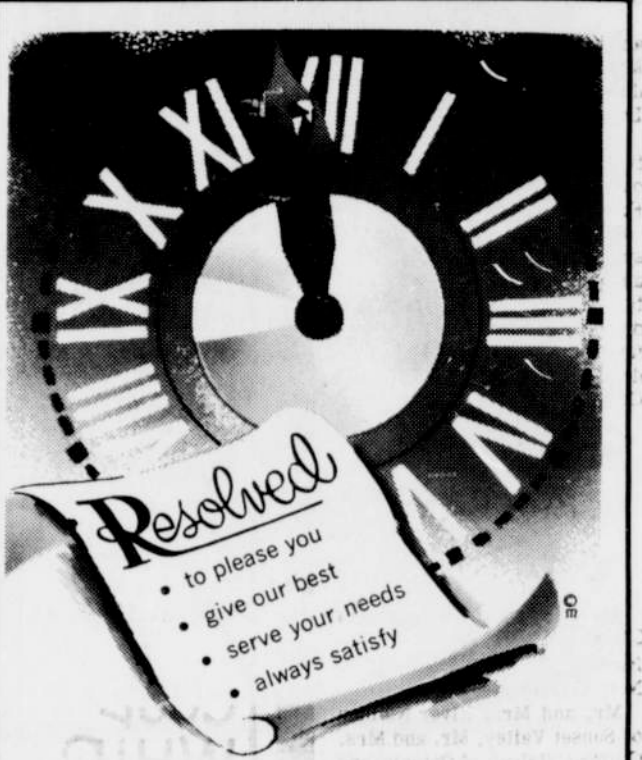
The program calls for group action to meet a need in a community while enabling 4-H members to learn better citizenship, he explains. It is anticipated that the grants will be used to supplement local resources.

The type of project which can be conducted under the program is almost unlimited, Myers continues. Some of the projects conducted in other states include citizenship workshops, organizing 4-H work for children of migrant workers, camping for disadvantaged youngsters and developing recreation facilities on community-owned land.

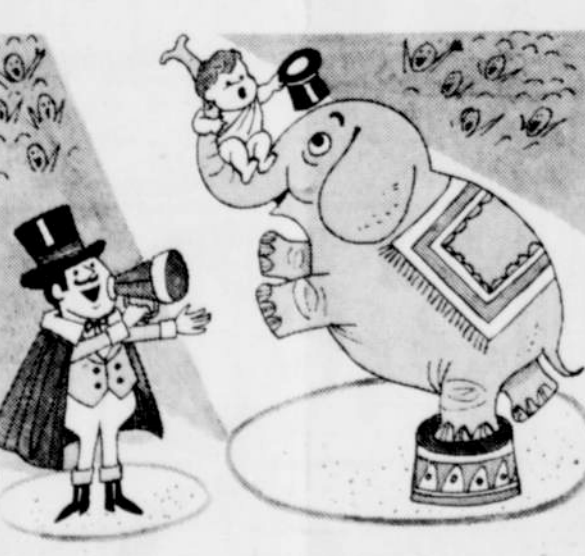

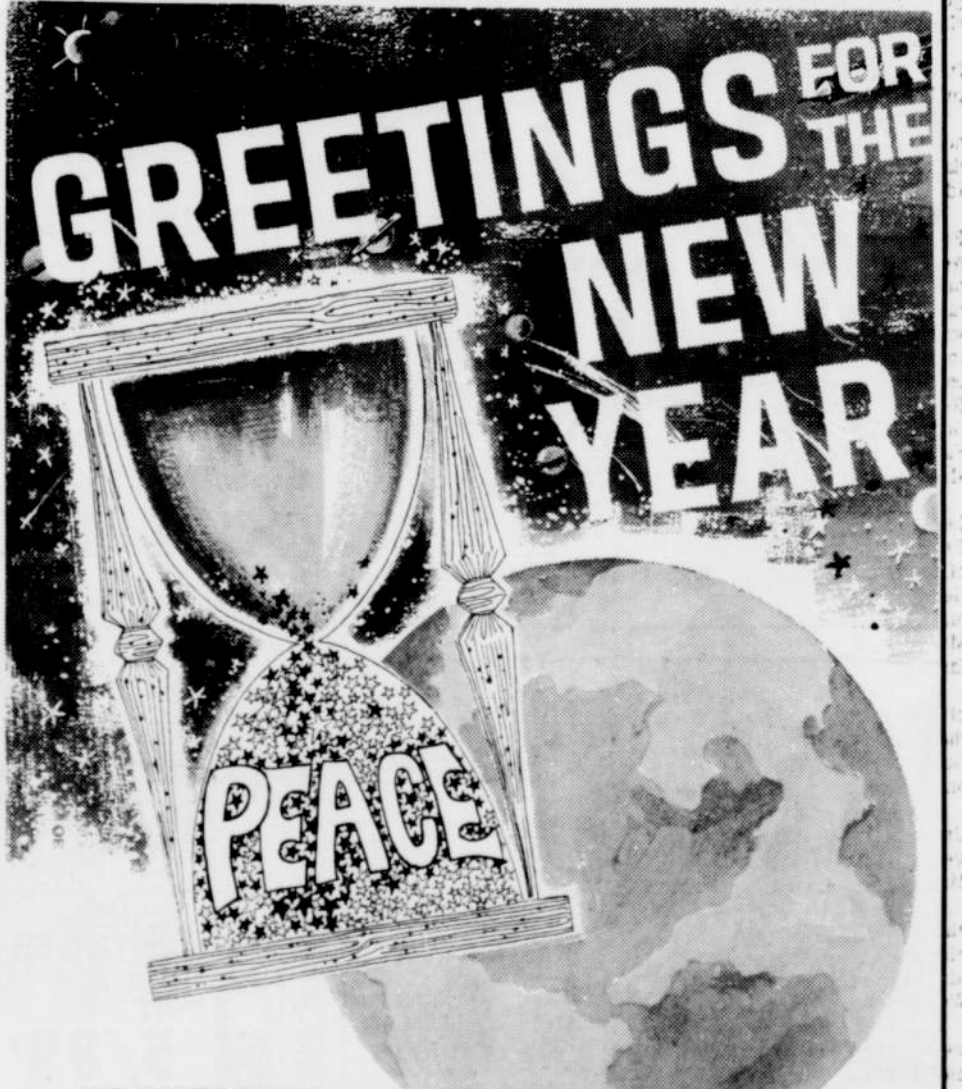
