10 YEARS AGO

20 YEARS AGO

For the second time within a period of slightly over 30 years, the price of the penny post card has been boosted from one cent to two cents. The increase became effective at midnight January 1.

Doubling the price of the post card brings to memory a similar circumstance that occurred during World War I, when the penny post card sold for two cents for 20 months. The government dropped the price back to one cent in 1919 and has it there in the face of rising prices charged for practically everything else.

Newspaper and magazine publishers will start paying 10 percent more postage on their products in April.

The temperature dropped to eight degrees above zero Wednesday morning for the coldest mark of the winter in Nyssa.

Mel Beck of Nyssa has purchased the Grigg Brothers and Butler Real Estate and Insurance Agency, which has been operating in Nyssa for the last three years. Beck has been associated with the firm since it was established in Nyssa and will remain in the same location.

30 YEARS AGO

Highways and roads in the vicinity were piled full of drifts in places by a strong wind Tuesday night and Wednesday. The snow was light and powdery.

Forecasts indicate that colder weather is in store for this community this week.

The need of a siren for air raid warnings that can be heard throughout the town was discussed at the weekly luncheon of the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce at noon Wednesday. A louder warning is needed as the fire siren cannot be heard in all parts of the city.

The Idaho Power Company provided Nyssa with fireworks between Christmas and New Year's.

Two 4,000-volt wires unaccountably flipped together at Main and Second Streets Monday morning at 8:15, burned in two and fell to the street. One of the wires struck a truck
