State Highway Engineer Roderick L. Porter retired December 31 after serving the Oregon State Highway Division for 39 years.
Porter was named Oregon's State Highway Engineer on July 1, 1970, following the retirement of Forrest Cooper.
He had served as Cooper's deputy since December, 1962.
Porter joined the Oregon State Highway Division shortly after his graduation from Oregon State University in 1932, where he received his degree in civil engineering.
For a short period following his graduation, he was employed by the former U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, but left to become a chainman for the Highway Division.
He has advanced through the ranks to the Division's top position and has served in all parts of the state.
Included among his positions were those of chainman, rodman, transitman, resident engineer, assistant and right of way engineer, office engineer, assistant highway engineer, and deputy highway engineer.
He was born March 11, 1906, in West Linn, Oregon.

Agriculture's Future Viewed By Ag Director

Despite setbacks for vegetable and tree fruit growers, state agriculture director, Irvin Mann, Jr., foresees a good year for Oregon agriculture.
However, he says that progress is dependent upon three factors, over two of which the farmer, himself, has no control.
Mann says the state's agricultural picture depends upon what happens in the administration of Phase Two of the president's program to curb inflation; congressional action to prevent future transportation stoppages and the outcome of the May primary vote on Ballot Measure 5, the so-called "water bank" act.
The director predicts that if Phase Two has the same effects in 1972 as in 1971, it could be the biggest thing to happen to agriculture in several decades.
He says it first would offer agricultural prices a chance to seek their own level and, secondly, it could continue to halt inflation that would tend to stabilize the operating costs of agriculture, which are currently forcing many producers to the wall.
"Congress must act to prevent the lifeline of the nation from being cut in two", said Mann.
Referring to the current work stoppage on the docks, he says it must be settled and noted that inter-industry conferences are being held throughout the northwest in an attempt to bring about a united front of congressional delegations of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Alaska and Hawaii in support of legislation to prevent future recurrences.
On the third factor, the water bank measure, Mann says, "The farmer has an element of control because he has a vote."
But he reminds that this needs the support of other voters and points out that benefits from passage of the measure go much further than just the farmer.
"If Ballot Measure Number 5 is enacted by the people, it would make 1972 the start of the biggest agricultural expansion and diversification ever experienced by any state in the union," he explained.
Mann thinks Governor Tom

Kelly is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Huffman of Nyssa.

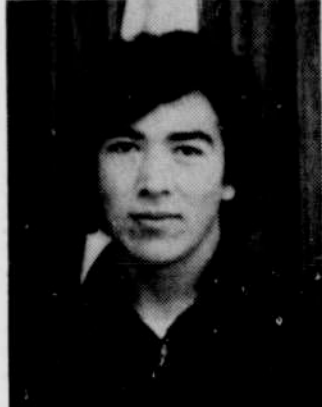


Rex R. Young
