**Archers Need Bow License**

Oregon archers are reminded by the Game Commission that in 1972 in addition to a regular hunting license a bow license is also required to hunt in any season established exclusively for archery hunting. The bow license fee is \$2.00 when purchased at the same time in combination with the regular hunting license, and \$5.00 when purchased there- after.

In other words, the combination hunter-bow license will cost the archer \$7.00, five dollars for the general hunting license and two dollars for the archery license. However, if the archer purchases only the general hunting license and at a later date purchased the bow license the cost is \$10.00, five dollars for the regular hunting license and five dollars for the bow license.

From the number of inquiries received by the Game Commission evidently there is some confusion among archers as well as license dealers in issuing the new bow license. To save themselves a few dollars bow hunters should make up their minds at the time they purchase 1972 hunting licenses and obtain the combination instead of purchasing the two separately.

The bow license is required to hunt in any specific archery season where hunting with other weapons is prohibited. The license is not needed to hunt with bow and arrow during the general big game seasons.

**QUESTIONNAIRES SENT TO HUNTERS**

About 18,000 nimrods -- roughly 6 percent of the total number of hunters -- will be asked to assist the Game Commission in the next two months with the annual survey to determine how many big game animals, upland game birds and waterfowl were taken during the 1971 hunting seasons.

This chosen group selected at random from the total of around 375,000 licensed hunters is being asked to give their individual reports on success or failure during the past year. Mailing of questionnaires is underway and should be completed by the first week in January.

John McKean, state game director, asked questionnaire recipients to answer all questions as accurately as they can recall and to record success as well as failure. The questionnaires should then be returned to the Game Commission.

The information provided by hunters is used to compute the total kill of game birds and animals for the year, which includes deer, elk, bear, upland game birds by species and all species of waterfowl.

Statisticians report that the total kill figures obtained from this random sample of hunters are very accurate. For deer,

**EMERGENCY HUNT APPLICATIONS DUE**

Oregon big game hunters interested in participating in emergency hunting seasons which may be scheduled in 1972 have until January 15 to submit applications. Hunters wishing to sign up must apply by postcard giving their name, address, telephone number and county applied for. Applications must be sent to the Game Commission's Portland headquarters, 1634 S.W. Alder.

Nimrods are reminded to file for only one county. Following the filing deadline, county rosters will be established and hunters called from these rosters if an emergency hunt is needed.

Residents 18 years of age or older may apply. A hunting license is not needed to file but licenses are required if a hunt is scheduled. Emergency hunts are held to control crop damage which may occur at any time during the year. Since it is impossible to predict when or if such damage may occur, it is necessary, according to law, to establish lists of eligible hunters at the beginning of each year.

The chance to participate is small with only a few such seasons held since 1957, the first year emergency seasons were authorized. It's a long-odds chance that such a season will be called in the coming year. Nonetheless, if a hunter wishes to have that chance he must have his name on the roster.

Also, if a hunt is scheduled, applicants are generally called by telephone and must be able to participate within a day or two of the notice.
