

OPENING DATES SET FOR 1972 HUNTING SEASONS

Oregon hunters will begin the general buck deer season about a week later than usual but the seasons for elk and upland game birds follow the traditional openings of the past.

This action was taken by the Oregon Game Commission Friday, January 7, at a public meeting in Portland scheduled for the purpose of establishing opening dates for the 1972 seasons.

The general buck season will open Saturday, October 7. The staff report indicated continued high mortality on 1971 fawns, especially on the mule deer ranges of eastern Oregon. This forecast prompted the Commission to set the opening later than usual and advised hunters that the outlook is also for a short deer season this fall.

Rocky Mountain elk herds look good and the Commission

set the opening date for this season for October 28. November 11 was established for the opening of the Roosevelt elk season. Early archery seasons will open August 26.

Pheasant and quail hunters will open the season on these upland birds on October 21, a few days later than usual. However, a week earlier opening would conflict with the harvest of seed crops in some of the better pheasant hunting areas.

The general season for chukar and Hungarian partridge was set to open with the deer season October 7. General regulations for the 1972 seasons will be established at a public hearing to be held in late May. At that time biological data on which to base length of seasons, bag limits, and other rules will be available to the Commission and the public.

Waterfowl Season Ends

Oregon shotgun enthusiasts are reminded that the general season for hunting waterfowl ended Sunday, January 9.

However, the season on ducks will continue in Columbia Basin counties through January 23. These counties include Baker, Gilliam, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, and Wasco. Bag limit on ducks in these counties is 7 per day, 14 in possession. Also, the season on geese extends through January 23 in those counties bordering the Columbia River. These counties include Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, and Umatilla. Elsewhere in the state goose hunting closes January 9.

The black brant season along the coast extends through February 20. This fine game bird is found mainly on Nehalem, Tillamook, and Netarts bays, traditionally favored resting and feeding areas. Black brant may also be found wintering on Siletz, Alsea, Coos, and other bays along the coast.

ANGLERS ASKED TO TURN IN CARDS

Sport fishermen are urged by the Game Commission to dig down in their wallets or other places they store hunting and fishing licenses and return their expired 1971 salmon-steelhead license, commonly called the salmon-steelhead record card.

Reino Koski, who has the important task of calculating total salmon and steelhead catch in the state, advised that collection boxes are available at all license agencies for the convenience of the angler. The cards also may be mailed directly to the Game Commission or turned in at any of its five regional offices.

Koski said the record cards provide the basis for calculating the total catch as well as determining the catch by individual streams. He advised anglers that it is important that all cards be returned to provide
