Greg Blanch continued his 22 point scoring average as Nyssa came from behind in the second half to beat Payette 73-62 Tuesday night for the Bulldog's 5th win of the season, all in SRV play.

This weekend they commence Greater Oregon League play with games Friday night against Burns and Saturday night against John Day. Both games will be preceded by JV competition on the Nyssa home court.

Payette started the game with a blistering attack, hitting for 80% and a 21-11 lead in the first quarter. The Bulldogs narrowed the gap to 3 points, but Payette still led 29-26 at halftime. NEW POSTAL RATES

New rates on third class mailing will become effective January 24, 1972, according to Lee Dail, Postmaster.

Bulk mailers will be increased from 4¢ to 5¢ per piece, or 28¢ per pound for circulars. Books and catalogs will be charged 5¢ per piece minimum or 21¢ per pound.

General public third class mailing will be a minimum of 8¢ for the first two ounces, increasing up to 45¢ for 15 ounces or more, not including 16 ounces. Articles weighing 16 ounces are classified as fourth class parcel post.

Navy Offers Trade Schools

PORTLAND. The Navy Recruiting Station announced today that it can now offer a school guarantee for sixteen different occupational specialties to those individuals who meet the following qualifications: 17 to 31 years of age, be a high school graduate or hold a GED equivalency certificate, and pass the basic mental and physical requirements for enlistment as well as for the specialty desired.

For each specialty there are specific qualifications to be met. Men meeting the high standards for these specialties will be able to choose from occupational fields such as: Operations Analysis, Operations Control, Graphics, Administration, Supply and Accounting, Food Preparation and Service, Medical, Electrical, Ordnance, Dental, Mechanical Precision Equipment, Mechanical Fabrication, to mention some.
