Population is expanding and people MUST live somewhere.

This idea of creating more wilderness is for the birds. Not one soul in the United States has a home that is located in an area that wasn't, at one time, a wilderness. Now that we have ours we seemingly don't care to share our good fortune. We have our homes and children, therefore this privilege must be denied others.

It looks bad for anyone living in the Treasure Valley to object to more population when they themselves have an additional summer home in the mountains. This is almost as bad as people with several grown children telling our young people that they must limit their families to no more than 2 children. You will frequently find those with a home or homes objecting to housing developments and highrise condominiums. There's plenty of room in the United States for an increase in population IF they are spread out.

Millions of new homes are needed. This brings up the problem of lumber. The concept of no new roads into the forests is wrong. We must harvest the forest and plant new growth IF we want our children's children to live as well as we do. We are placing recreation as a paramount factor in the United States and we cry when our own personal pleasure is hampered. We had better start sharing with others or we may soon find that others are unwilling to share with us.
