Educational Aid Benefits Available To Servicemen

State educational aid benefits were paid to 289 veterans in 1971 in the amount of \$36,281, the Department of Veterans' Affairs reported today. The number of students enrolled was down 11 percent from 1969.

Since the program started in 1945, payments have gone to 14,786 veterans in the amount of \$4,297,791, for an average payment per veteran of \$290.

H. C. Saalfeld, veterans' affairs director, said veterans planning to use the benefits this winter should immediately contact their school registrar, a county service officer or the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Entitled are Korean war veterans and recipients of the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal or the Vietnam Service Medal. There is no deadline for these groups to apply.

World War II Veterans may still be entitled, but only if they started drawing benefits before June 30, 1959, and have remaining entitlement.

To qualify, a veteran must have been an Oregon resident for one year prior to his military service, he must have served 90 days or more during war-time or after July 1, 1958, and he must be an Oregon resident when he applies. He can't draw state benefits for studies for which he is receiving federal educational benefits based on military service.

The state benefit pays \$50 for each month of full-time undergraduate college studies and up to \$35 a month for other studies, based on one month's entitlement for each month of military service, up to 36 months.

SAFE SLEEPWEAR FOR CHILDREN

The U.S. Department of Commerce has issued a flammability standard for children's sleepwear; yet there is no way now of knowing which sleepwear in stores is flame-proof unless you read the labels. Some brands of flame-resistant sleepwear are already on the market, and they are voluntarily labeled to indicate that they are flame-resistant.

Garments that do not measure up to the federal standard by the end of July 1972 must have the following label: "Flammable (does not meet USDC standard). Should not be worn near sources of fire."
