10 YEARS AGO

The danger of flooding from ice-blocked Snake River in Ontario, Weiser and Payette areas has eased off somewhat with the gradual rise in temperatures during the past few days.

C.E. Leseberg, Nyssa contractor, and successful bidder on the Owyhee dam road project, said Wednesday that he would be unable to start any part of the construction until the frost was all out of the ground, but that he hoped to have the entire job completed by June 1 of this year.

20 YEARS AGO

Spring run-off water gushed down Lockett gulch, washed out a large tree at the new culvert-bridge on the Nyssa-Adrian highway Saturday night and caused an outage of Idaho Power Service.

As the flood waters rushed down the gulch of Cow Hollow last Saturday, they tore out bridges and culverts, according to farmers living in the area.

The water was lashing at the upper banks and roaring angrily, it sounded like the ocean. First it ripped over the small bridge on Clarence Niccum's place and one by one beat down the larger bridges on the Shulties, Crutchfield, Ray Strickland, Widmer, Morton, Niccum and Joe Stephen roads. It surged through John Strickland's yard and tore out the country bridge south of his place.

Some Cow Hollow residents put in temporary foot crossings, some used ladders and planks, and some used the canal road above their homes. Solomon, city recorder, \$125 to \$150; Cliff Greer, water department, \$115 to \$130; and A.L. Fletcher, city attorney, \$300 to \$400 a year.

50 YEARS AGO

A jolly sleigh load of high school people enjoyed a coasting party, Monday night on the hill near Toombs. Big bonfires cheerfully lighted the hill. SN DAVID WILSON TELLS OF QUAKE

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wilson received a letter from their son David last week. SN David Wilson, who is on active duty with the U.S. Navy in Taiwan, experienced an earthquake recently with the intensity similar to the one in Alaska a few years ago.

In his letter David said, "By now you have probably already heard about the earthquake that hit us. Boy, I was never so scared in my life as I was this morning when it hit. I thought for sure that our three story apartment house was going to cave in. It was shaking so hard that I don't know why it is still standing up. It only lasted two minutes, but that was the longest two minutes in my life. Two hours later we had another quake that was about as bad. The first one registered 7.6 on the Richter scale and the second was 7.2. To think that the one they had in Anchorage, Alaska a few years ago was 7.0."

David also called his family Saturday evening and at that time stated that during the quake, the water in his "waterbed" sloshed around until he thought it would burst. He is living on the first floor of a three story structure. They experienced earthquakes daily in Taiwan but are mostly small tremors.

A tidal wave was expected to follow the earthquake but never did materialize, much to everyone's relief.
