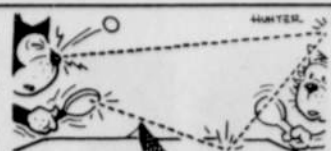

Welfare Recovery Division To Expand According To Johnson

"I am pleased to announce major expansion of the Department of Justice Welfare Recovery efforts to all 36 Oregon counties. Our plan is to expand the Portland office and open a new office in Bend during this quarter and by next September we will have offices in Eugene, Medford, Pendleton and Ontario.

"For several years the Department of Justice has conducted intensive efforts to make defaulting fathers perform their legal responsibilities for supporting their children rather

than requiring these children to be dependent upon Public Welfare. In the past two years this program has been substantially overhauled. As a consequence many families have been taken off the welfare rolls and recoveries for 1969-71 exceeded \$2.7 million. Our costs were \$698,000.

With our expansion we anticipate recoveries will exceed \$5 million per biennium.

While our past successes in welfare recovery have been encouraging, we suffered from inadequate staff and were able to operate with full effectiveness in only 18 counties of the state. The principle difficulty was refusal of the federal government, namely the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, to participate in funding the project, although non-support enforcement is required under the Social Security Act.

In 1969 Governor McCall, as part of his welfare reform program, and I undertook intensive negotiation with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to attain their participation in Oregon's welfare recovery program. At one point, we had to threaten legal action under the Social Security Act. Finally, HEW reversed its position and has now agreed to participate on a 50-50 basis. Their participation makes expansion of this program now possible.

Revenues recovered through our program go as a direct offset to welfare benefits thus reducing the cost of the welfare system to Oregon taxpayers.

Herb Sez ...

I wonder just who thought up the latest gimmick for advertising Idaho. "Ski the Great Idaho Potato", it says. They portray a something or other skiing in a big potato. Just how nutty can we get here in Idaho? Every other state portrays its wonders to entice people to spend some vacation money within their borders. We who lay claim to be one of the most photogenic states in the Union don't show lofty ski slopes and forested hills for skiing, we show the potato.

It's bad enough to force the cattlemen, lumberjacks, miners and people in the tourist business to advertise the potato throughout the nation on our licenses, but to take the advertising tax dollar to try getting people interested in beautiful Idaho by skiing on a potato is completely mad.

I have had many people tell me they would never think of traveling to Idaho for a vacation because they weren't interested in seeing a potato field. I attended a meeting at which there was one couple from each one of the 50 states of the Union, Puerto Rico and the provinces of Canada. One morning I presented each one with a slab of polished sagebrush with a piece of Idaho rock glued to it. I told them that I wanted them to know there was something else in Idaho other than mashed potatoes. I made the statement about Idaho having more national forests than any other state with the exception of Alaska and was challenged by 75% of the group who didn't realize that Idaho had any forests or deserts. All they had heard about was the potato.

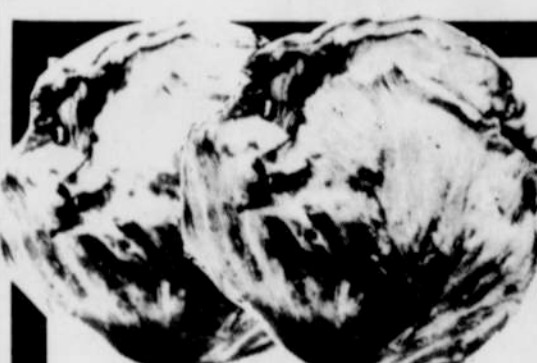
