Hereford Breeders Meet Feb. 4

Gov. McCall Designates Industrial Safety Week

Governor Tom McCall designated February 7-11 as Industrial Safety Week when he signed the official proclamation Jan. 12. On the last two days of Industrial Safety Week, the Governor's 14th Industrial Safety Conference will meet at the Sheraton Motor Inn in Portland.

"Workmen's compensation and industrial safety are two vitally important programs in

the state and in the nation," said McCall. "Since 1966 we have added more than 220,000 Oregon workmen to the lists of those protected by compensation insurance against the prospect of industrial injury. Today, over 600,000 Oregonians enjoy both compensation and accident prevention services under this law.

"But even more important, the Williams-Steiger Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 marks the beginning of a nationwide, concentrated program to bring these same safety and compensation benefits to millions of workmen all across America."

"I am proud to point to Oregon's record of achievement in pioneering workmen's compensation."

"But it is in the area of accident prevention that I invite attention from the entire nation. Our record of a 30 percent reduction in the frequency of industrial deaths over the last five years should serve as an inspiration to industries all across America."

Oregon entered into an agreement with the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the U.S. Department of Labor, April 29, 1971, under which the state will develop a system of safety codes and code enforcement which is consonant with the federal system.

THE WIFES DUTY
Never should a wife display her best conduct, her accomplishments, her smiles, and her best nature, exclusively away from home.

Be careful of your purchases, let your husband know what you buy, and that you have wisely expended your money.

Let no wife devote a large portion of her time to society-work which shall keep her away from home daytimes and evenings, without the full concurrence of her husband.

Beware of entrusting the confidence of your household to outside parties. The moment you discuss the faults of your husband with another, that moment an element of discord has been admitted and will one day rend your family circle.

If in moderate circumstances do not be over ambitious to make an expensive display in your rooms. Let the adorning of your private rooms be largely the work of your own hands.

Beware of bickering about little things. Your husband returns from his work, with his mind absorbed in business. In his dealings with his employees, he is in the habit of giving commands and of being obeyed. In his absent-mindedness, he does not realize possibly, the change from his business to his home. Should this be the case, avoid all disputes. What matters where a picture hangs or a vase may sit. Make the home so charming and well ordered, your husband will be relieved of its care and willingly yield up its entire management to yourself.
